

## Intel Overview

Intel is the world's largest semiconductor chip maker, based on revenue. We develop advanced integrated digital technology products, primarily integrated circuits, for industries such as computing and communications. We serve customers in more than 120 countries, and at fiscal year-end 2009 had 79,800 employees in more than 50 countries.

Intel is headquartered in Santa Clara, California and incorporated in the state of Delaware. We have more than 42,000 employees in the United States.

As a global corporation, more than three-fourths of Intel's revenue comes from outside the U.S., yet roughly three-fourths of the company's microprocessor manufacturing is done here in America, at our facilities in Arizona, Oregon, New Mexico and Massachusetts.

From 2002 through 2009, Intel's combined U.S. R&D and capital spending totaled nearly \$60 billion. Ongoing U.S. Investments such as these have made Intel one of the top private employers in three of the seven states where Intel has key facilities.

These sponsored education programs include the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair (Intel ISEF) and the Intel Science Talent Search (Intel STS).

Beyond education, Intel also works in our communities, combining technical expertise, the energy of employees, and creative ideas to help enhance communities across America.

Through the Intel Involved Matching Grant Program, the Intel Foundation makes cash donations to qualified nonprofits and schools where Intel employees and retirees volunteer.

Intel employees and retirees also support the community through an annual giving campaign. The Intel Foundation matches employee gifts up to \$10 million. The 2009 campaign generated contributions through local United Ways of nearly \$22.7 million.

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
