# Chapter 1

# **About This TechNote**

This TechNote provides Compaq server management integration guidelines for ManageWise. The network and hardware configurations that Compaq selected to test might not be the same as your configuration.

**NOTE:** This TechNote details integration of Insight Manager 2.61 with ManageWise 1.0. Please note that the recommended steps do not apply to any other combination of the products, including Insight Manager 3.x with ManageWise 2.x or Insight Manager 2.61 with ManageWise 2.x. For regiatered users of Insight Manager 3.0, copies of Insight Manager 2.61 are available free of charge. To obtain your free copy, contact Compaq Technical Support and request Spare Part Number 181164-001. Compaq and Novell are committed to bringing joint customers fully integrated and tested management solutions. To this end, integration of Insight Manager 3.x with ManageWise 2.x is on-going. However, at the time of publication of this document, work was still in progress.



# Chapter 2

# **Network Management**

This TechNote is intended for network administrators who need to know the critical success factors for integrating the management technologies and tools of Compaq servers and client desktop PCs into a broader network management environment. Compaq servers support Compaq developed, SNMP-based management agents running under network operating systems such as Microsoft Windows NT, NetWare, SCO OpenServer, UnixWare, IBM OS/2, and UNIX to provide management of the hardware. The Compaq Deskpro Family supports "Intelligent Manageability," which moves many Compaq server management technologies to the desktop. Compaq Desktop Management Solution Partners access these Intelligent Manageability features.

The typical network configuration can include devices such as routers, bridges, gateways, and other SNMP-host computers. Figure 2-1 is an example of such a network.



**Figure 2-1.** Typical network configuration

# 2-2 Network Management

Managing a multivendor, multioperating system environment, similar to the typical network configuration illustrated in Figure 2-1, is a complex process. However, such networks are not uncommon in many organizations and might resemble your own.

Compaq provides you with tools for managing Compaq servers and desktops. These tools build upon the functionality and features engineered into the servers and desktops. The tools, used in combination with tools specific to your network operating system, can provide you with cost-effective methods to manage your network.

Compaq server management technologies, desktop Intelligent Manageability, and tools adhere to accepted network management standards such as:

- Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP)
- Point-to-Point Protocol (PPP)
- Transmission Control Protocol (TCP) and Internet Protocol (IP)
- Internet Packet Exchange (IPX)
- Telnet
- Windows Internet Name Service (WINS)
- Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP)
- American Network Standards Institute (ANSI) terminal emulation

The Compaq commitment to standards assures you the flexibility and cost-effectiveness of an open, industry-standard solution.

# **Network Management Terms**

Table 2-1 contains a list of network management terms and definitions associated with computing devices, infrastructure devices, and network protocols. In this TechNote, the *first reference* of the network management term is used to introduce a term and the *second reference* is used for the remainder of the document.

# 2-4 Network Management




Figure 2-2. Relationship of network management terms

Figure 2-2 illustrates the relationship between the network management terminology described in Table 2-1.

In summary, every managed device:

- Possesses a set of managed objects that correspond to hardware subsystems and software components.
- Possesses a number of attributes that describe the objects. The attributes of the managed device are *readable* and might be *writable* by a management application.
- Sends notification of changes in operating status and information about a failure condition to a management application.

# **Discussion of Network Management**

Network management enables the monitoring, analysis, and control of computing and infrastructure devices, as well as the network protocols.

Managed devices can include the following:

- Computing devices -- servers, desktops, workstations, hosts, and mainframes
- Infrastructure devices -- bridges, routers, gateways, and hubs

Today, management applications exist that allow you to monitor the status of attributes, analyze their condition, and perform a resulting action on a managed device. For example, you might choose to reset a port on a hub when the device attached to that port generates an excessive number of network errors.

A benefit of network management is that it allows you to provide acceptable service levels to your users in the most cost-effective manner. This service, in turn, depends on several issues such as:

- How critical is uptime to your network?
- How much do you want to restrict access to the network?
- What level of performance do you expect to achieve?
- What does it cost to manage your network effectively?

Network management often requires you to balance several objectives that could be contradictory. For example, two of your requirements might be to reduce costs and reduce downtime. However, the cost of 100-percent uptime is often prohibitive.

# 2-6 Network Management

The following is a sample of the factors that contribute to the complexity of network management:

- Networks containing a variety of devices.
- Varying requirements from one user organization to another; each organization perceives its needs to be unique.
- Users have a sharply different perception and expectation than network administrators and MIS management within an organization. This problem becomes more complicated because of the growing influence of new technology and the need for businesses to rightsize their computing environments.
- Lack of easy to use, broad-based solutions.
- The focus of many management solutions today is to manage a single-network element such as a bridge, a router, or a server. For PC-based networks, some solutions specialize in certain areas of network management such as configuration or performance monitoring. Management solutions that can manage several network devices and support multiple functional areas of network management typically require additional systems integration.

# Standards-Based Network Management Model

The International Standards Organization (ISO) has formulated a network management framework because the scope of network management is so broad. This management framework is a document that provides a reference for coordinating development of management standards. *The Basic Reference Model of Open Systems Interconnection (OSI), ISO 7498 — Part 4* describes the functional areas of network management. This reference document supplements the ISO Open Systems Interconnection (OSI) model. The OSI model describes the seven protocol layers (that is, physical through application layer) and the activities necessary, at each layer, for systems to interconnect over communications media such as a telephone line, a serial cable, or a coaxial cable.

The ISO network management model identifies five functional areas of management. They are:

- Fault Management
- Performance Management
- Configuration Management
- Security Management
- Accounting Management

There are several publications, as well as the ISO standard itself, that can provide you with complete details on each of these management areas. The following is just a brief overview of the typical requirements in each area.

# **Fault Management**

Detecting faults and notifying network administrators of a fault occurrence is an intrinsic function of network management. This function becomes critical in a distributed networking environment, particularly in an economic climate where shrinking budgets force MIS departments to automate remote fault detection and resolution. Compaq recognizes the importance of this category by providing devices that provide a wide array of fault tolerant features, and monitorable error indicator attributes, and "fault prediction" attributes. With fault prediction attributes, you can proactively manage the devices to predict faults and provide maximum server uptime.

# **Performance Management**

Performance management allows you to monitor, analyze, and tune devices and network operation. This function is important in a distributed networking environment where the application or network uptime is mission critical. With performance data available, you can do capacity planning to enable the cost-effective growth of your ever-changing network.

# **Configuration Management**

New devices such as servers, workstations, printers, routers, and specialized high-speed links are constantly added to networks as the prices of computing resources drop. The term "network" takes on new meaning when you consider devices such as laptops, that at times are not connected to the network. With configuration management you can effectively monitor the existence and configuration of the computing assets deployed on your network.

# **Security Management**

There are two facets to security management. They are:

- Allowing legitimate users access to information relevant to their job function
- Restricting unauthorized users

Under no circumstances should all users automatically get rights to access all information. Access rights must be set up in a consistent manner, so you can quickly track access violations.

As your organization grows, it might become necessary to separate your network into smaller workgroups, each part of a logical domain such as Sales, Marketing, Engineering, and so on. You need to control intra-domain access in a way that makes it easy for your users to share information, while preventing abuse. Similar, though more restrictive, access applies to exchanging information with external sources such as your suppliers, customers, consultants, and so on. Another concern is physical security (access to the hardware), as well as operating system security and network security (access to data).

# **Accounting Management**

Today, networks can offer a variety of services from video conferences, to e-mail, to file sharing. It is often necessary to monitor the usage of these services so you can distribute the costs equitably and charge back to individual cost centers. Knowledge of usage patterns can also assist you in capacity planning and in redeploying network resources to serve changing needs.

# **Network Management Standards**

As discussed earlier, managing a network is complex. Management becomes even more complicated without standards. When an organization purchases multiple management tools, each with a different method of managing a particular hardware or software product, it must then maintain and train network administrators in different tools. This is expensive and inefficient. Consequently, standards committees have developed protocols for network management.

### SNMP Standard

The Internet Engineering Task Force (IETF), the standards rating body for the world-wide Internetwork, has defined a management protocol. The Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) has accumulated a major share of the market and has the support of over 20,000 different products. SNMP has its roots in the Internet community — the complexity of large international TCP/IP networks provided the necessary incentive to develop a standard method of managing devices on the network.

Within the SNMP framework, manageable network devices (routers, bridges, servers, and so on) contain a software component called a management agent. The agent monitors the various subsystems of the network element and stores this information in a management information base (MIB). Conceptually, the MIB is a database, readable and writable by a management application using the SNMP protocol.

There are two types of MIBs:

2-10 Network Management

■ Internet Management MIBs -- These MIBs include MIB-II, RMON, and others. These MIBs, standardized by the Internet community, represent the core objects that are common across the widest range of network devices implementing the Internet protocols. Examples of these objects include network protocols such as TCP/IP and network devices such as Ethernet network interfaces.

■ Vendor MIBs -- These MIBs represent objects that are unique to an individual vendor's product or product line. Over 500 vendors and organizations have created their own vendor MIBs. Compaq was the first personal computer company to develop a MIB that enabled SNMP management of server hardware.

The majority of vendors of internetworking devices have embraced the SNMP standard, including:

- Bay Networks Incorporated
- Cisco Systems Incorporated
- Cabletron
- 3Com Corporation

SNMP has also gained acceptance among vendors who have developed compliant management platforms, including:

- HP OpenView (Hewlett-Packard Company)
- NetView for AIX (IBM)
- SunNet Manager (SunConnect -- a Sun Microsystems, Inc. Business)

Among server vendors, Compaq offers SNMP-compliant management agents that provide specific Compaq device information. These include:

- Compaq Insight Management Server Agents for Microsoft Windows NT
- Compaq Insight Management Server Agents for NetWare
- Compaq Insight Management Server Agents for SCO OpenServer
- Compaq Insight Management Server Agents for UnixWare
- Compaq Insight Management Server Agents for IBM OS/2
- Compaq Insight Management Server Agents for SCO UNIX

SNMP often uses the network for sending and receiving management information. This is called "in-band" management, however, SNMP is not limited to in-band management. In-band management is discussed in more detail later in this chapter.

SNMP supports both read and write operations (GET and SET) commands on attributes. Some vendors do not support the SET command because of the potential to allow an unauthorized person to alter critical parameters on a network element. Insight Server Agents support the SNMP community string and a command line argument to control SET operation behavior of non-critical parameters. For more detailed information about the Insight Server Agents for a particular operating system, refer to the appropriate *Compaq Insight Management Server Agents User Guide*.

**NOTE**: Some users of SNMP have expressed concern over the low level of security mechanisms employed. In response to that concern, the Internet community has recently specified SNMPv2. SNMPv2 is the next version of the Simple Network Management Protocol that includes improvements to SNMP in the areas of performance, security, confidentiality, and manager-to-manager communications. At this time, SNMPv2 has not been implemented by vendors of network devices.

### 2-12 Network Management

SNMP is associated with TCP/IP and monitoring devices on Ethernet networks because of its long association with the Internet. However, you can use SNMP over other protocols such as IPX and AppleTalk. For example, the Compaq Insight Manager application supports SNMP over IPX and IP.

**NOTE**: For an in-depth discussion of SNMP, refer to *The Simple Book - An Introduction to Internet Management* by Marshall T. Rose (Prentice-Hall).

The SNMPv1 management protocol specifies four operations that a management application can use to manage information *known* to the agent. These are the GET, GET-NEXT, SET, and TRAP operations, all briefly described as follows:

### **■** GET and GET-NEXT

The management application uses the GET and GET-NEXT (read) commands to acquire the data, the MIB variables, that provide the mechanism for monitoring. The Compaq Insight MIBs, included with the Compaq Insight Server Agents, describe the MIB variables.

### ■ SET

The SET (write) operation allows the management application to set or change a variable value that is known to the agent.

### **■** TRAP

The management agents can send asynchronous trap messages or unsolicited information when they determine that a significant fault or performance event has occurred. All traps generated by Insight Server Agents are Compaq enterprise traps.

# Methods of Managing Network Resources

There are two different methods to access your network resources. Your computer can access the managed device(s) "in-band" using the network or "out-of-band" through a point-to-point connection such as a modem link. The operational status of your network device(s) influence the actions that you perform at the computer. The element is either "online," providing its network services (such as routing packets or sharing files), or "offline," *not* providing network services due to routine maintenance or catastrophic failure.

## **In-Band Device Access**

Regardless of the operational status of the device, in-band access requires an operational network link between the device and computer. In-band management is useful for local access or even remote access when you are confident of your LAN and WAN infrastructure.

### **Out-of-Band Device Access**

In contrast to in-band device access, out-of-band access does not require an operational network. You can remotely access a device using out-of-band management when access does not exist to a LAN or WAN, either by design or due to the failure of a network link. Typically, you would establish an out-of-band device access to provide a point-to-point connection between a management console and the managed device. For example, you might use out-of-band management when the remote office is not on the network.

# **Online Management**

Online management refers to the management of an operational network device. The following sections discuss online in-band and online out-of-band management.

### Online In-Band Management

This is the most common management model, since most network administrators are confident of their LAN and WAN infrastructure. The management actions between the management application and the managed device occur within the network. These actions include reading and writing attributes. The network carries regular data as well as management data. This model is very cost-effective because management data typically uses only a small percentage of overall network bandwidth, and you do not need an alternate network to carry the data. However, overloading the network with management data can cause network performance degradation.

### **Online Out-of-Band Management**

This management model is less common, but can be useful for branch office environments. In contrast to in-band management, the management actions between the application and the managed device occur outside a network, usually via an asynchronous or modem connection. Otherwise, all capabilities are the same as online in-band management.

You can use two standard transport protocols to perform out-of-band SNMP management:

- Serial Line Internet Protocol (SLIP)
- Point-to-Point Protocol (PPP)

In addition to SLIP and PPP, many vendors use proprietary protocols to perform out-of-band management.

# **Offline Management**

When you need to perform an operation such as recovery of a failed network device, one that no longer provides services to the network, the operation is usually considered maintenance. In general, offline maintenance tasks require the use of recovery tools, as well as the replacement of failed components. Typically, this management style requires a remote logon to the failed device to perform recovery operations such as diagnostics, configuration, or firmware update.

### Offline In-Band Management

Applications to perform offline in-band management include:

- NetWare Virtual Terminal (NVT) over IPX
- Telnet over IP

### Offline Out-Of-Band Management

Local terminals (or via modem) with ANSI and VT100 terminal emulation capabilities perform offline out-of-band management.

Many vendors use proprietary protocols and applications to perform offline management including:

- Telnet
- ANSI
- VT100

# Server Management as a Subset of Network Management

LANs are strategic resources for the development and deployment of critical applications. Businesses are increasingly deploying LANs to rightsize their operations and capitalize on improved economic results. Consequently, the cost associated with hiring, training, and keeping skilled network administrative personnel to support a growing and complex LAN environment continues to increase. LAN management tools help control the rising costs of LAN administration while increasing the dependability of network environments.




Figure 2-3. Server management

Network administrators have sophisticated management tools for network resources such as bridges, routers, and concentrators, as well as network protocols. However, to manage servers, a key network resource, network administrators have typically used simple tools. The comprehensive manageability of servers and sophisticated server management tools are essential requirements for PC networks. As shown in Figure 2-3, these server management requirements include in-depth monitoring, analysis, and control of the performance, fault, and configuration aspects of the server operation.

Effective server management requires:

- Built-in capabilities to the server and options
- Strict adherence to popular network management standards for communication protocols and data interchange
- Tools that operate within the customer's preferred environment

The combination of these capabilities allows you to manage the server to ensure that it is one of the most reliable resources in the network.

# **Desktop Management as a Subset of Network Management**

The increasing emphasis on PC LANs has made manageability of PC networks a key customer need. Many businesses are increasing their dependence on PC networks. Large businesses are installing increasingly larger and more complex PC networks; therefore, customers are now demanding significant network dependability.

To meet these customer needs, Compaq has forged close alliances with leading vendors of PC LAN management applications. In conjunction with this effort, Compaq has also implemented desktop PC management capabilities called Intelligent Manageability.




Figure 2-4. Desktop and server management

These comprehensive management capabilities make network PCs easier to manage and less expensive to maintain. Figure 2-4 illustrates an example of today's typical data flow when managing a PC network.

Effective desktop management requires:

- Enhanced desktop hardware features that provide a rich set of management capabilities, including Asset and Fault Management
- Close integration of hardware, operating systems, and management software
- Support for a wide range of network management standards
- Fault management of client PCs through standard management products

All of these Intelligent Manageability features are designed to provide manageable PCs that work in any customer's strategic environment. No matter what scale of management a customer uses, the Compaq Deskpro Family has features that add value in the realm of managing networks.

Compaq integrates hardware management features and complementary management tools to provide a complete server and desktop PC management solution for the network administrator.




Figure 3-1. Compaq server management framework

# Compaq Server Management Technologies

The ability to manage server fault conditions, using advanced technologies, is a significant aspect in any server operation. Every hardware subsystem (such as the hard drive, system memory, and system processor) in Compaq servers has a robust set of management capabilities, designed-in, that address one or more of the fault, performance, and configuration management aspects of server operation.

Network dependability is enhanced by delivering timely information on the operational status of critical server subsystems. Using this information to manage faults is the focus of a comprehensive design approach to server and network uptime. Compaq refers to this design as "Full-Spectrum Fault Management." These fault management technologies provide you with the ability to prevent faults before they happen, keep the system up and running in case of an unlikely failure, or deliver rapid recovery to normal operation after a fault condition.

Full-Spectrum Fault Management is built into Compaq servers. Figure 3-2 illustrates the fault management process.

#### **Fault Prevention**

Compaq servers provide a fault prevention feature designed to predict and avoid failures. Compaq Server Parameter Tracking forms the foundation of Compaq server management. Server Parameter Tracking combines hardware, firmware, and industry-standard management software. It provides timely fault, performance, and configuration information for the critical processor, memory, and I/O (storage and network interface) server subsystems and server environment.

Server Parameter Tracking immediately notifies you of impending component failures, enabling preventive maintenance that avoids server failures and maximizes network uptime. For example, predictive storage subsystem tracking warns you of impending failure, allowing you to replace the hard drive or disk controller prior to failure.

#### **Fault Tolerance**

Compaq servers also provide a set of fault-tolerant features designed to keep the server up and running if a failure occurs. Compaq ProLiant servers come standard with the "Hot-Pluggable Drive" capability. This feature allows you to replace hard drives without interrupting server operation, thereby maximizing server availability.

Compaq ProLiant servers also can include an "Off-Line Backup Processor." The Off-line Backup Processor automatically reboots to a second processor if the first processor fails.

These features complement additional capabilities such as Advanced Error Checking and Correcting (ECC) Memory and the Compaq SMART SCSI Array Controller to maintain a high level of server availability and ensure data integrity.

#### **Integration Management**

Integration management is provided by the Compaq Integration Server, which is a server that has been designated to supply operating system software, database software, drivers, and patches to other devices over a network. When a new or existing server is connected to the same network as the Compaq Integration Server, the new server can obtain a fresh setup or an update to existing software via the Compaq Integration Server.

See the *Compaq Insight Manager User Guide* for more information on integration management.

## **Rapid Recovery**

Compaq servers offer another important built-in capability to manage faults. If a critical server failure occurs, the server can automatically recover. The "Compaq Rapid Recovery Engine" is engineered into Compaq ProLiant servers to diagnose and rapidly return the server to full operation. You can use the Rapid Recovery Engine independently of other server management products or you can use it with Compaq server management tools.

The Rapid Recovery Engine performs several functions that can intelligently and automatically restart the server without user intervention, including:

- Server Health Logging
- Capturing snapshots of the subsystem parameters that indicate failure and placing them into nonvolatile health logs and history tables.
- Automatic Server Recovery-2 (ASR-2)
  - □ Restarting the server and resetting all option boards.
  - ☐ Using the nonvolatile logs to recover, reconfigure, and automatically correct failures to the processor and cache, memory failures, and software errors.




Figure 3-3. Rapid Recovery Engine flowchart

Figure 3-3 illustrates how the Rapid Recovery Engine process detects and resolves critical errors in your Compaq server.

#### Server Health Logs

Server Health Logs store error information in nonvolatile memory so that Compaq utilities and network administrators can retrieve and analyze the data later. You can view the server health log contents using the Compaq Inspect Utility or Compaq Insight Manager. By analyzing the data from the server health logs, you can increase your efficiency in resolving current server problems as well as prevent future server errors. The Compaq Diagnostics software also uses the data from the server health logs to streamline its testing and quickly pinpoint problems.

The server health logs include the following:

- Critical Error Log -- records catastrophic errors, such as noncorrectable memory, expansion board, and expansion bus arbitration errors. After a critical error occurs, the system ROM indicates on bootup that an error has occurred and prompts you to run Compaq utilities. The Critical Error Log contains the time, date, and frequency of errors logged. When a critical error is logged, the server can notify you when it reboots.
- Corrected Error Log -- contains the date, time, frequency, and unique information about errors that the various subsystems have automatically corrected, such as ECC Memory errors.
- Power-On Error Log -- records any errors that occur during Power-On Self-Test (POST).
- Revision History Table -- stores board revision information in nonvolatile memory. It logs the system board revision first and then logs other boards that support the Revision History Table, such as the Compaq SMART SCSI Array Controller, Compaq NetFlex-3 Controller, Compaq Fast-SCSI-2 Controller, Compaq Fast-Wide SCSI-2 Controller, and Compaq IDA-2 Controller. When you upgrade your server or when you add new expansion boards, the Revision History Table logs this information. As you troubleshoot server problems, you can use this information to determine if a change to the server configuration has caused the server problem.

Refer to the appropriate Compaq server user guide for a more detailed description of the server health logs.

#### **Automatic Server Recovery-2**

Automatic Server Recovery-2 (ASR-2) intelligently restarts the server, analyzes the server health logs, and automatically corrects many errors such as processor, memory, server environment failures, and software errors. ASR-2 also informs network administrators by accessing a telephone pager to notify them that a failure has occurred and that it has been corrected.

Table 3-1 describes the critical errors detected by ASR-2.

Table 3-1 Critical Errors		
Type Description		
Software Errors	Catastrophic software errors that cause the server to cease operation, such as operating system abnormal termination or "hung" application software.	
Memory Errors	Memory errors that cannot be corrected and cause the server operating system to cease operation.	
Server Environment Errors	Internal server temperature that exceeds the factory preset threshold.	
	AC power failure (requires Compaq UPS).	
Processor Board Errors	Catastrophic failure of the system processor board.	

#### **Remote Maintenance**

The Remote Maintenance feature allows you to diagnose errors and configure the server from any location, either on the network or via modem. This option is necessary only if the ASR-2 process cannot perform an automatic recovery. During the initial system configuration process, these utilities are copied to a special system utility partition on the hard drive.

Using remote maintenance requires:

- An operating system with ASR-2 support.
- Compaq System Configuration Utility 2.22 or later and Diagnostics utilities installed locally on the system partition of the hard drive.
- ASR-2 configured to load the Compaq utilities after the server restarts.

#### **Using a Modem Connection**

If you choose to perform remote maintenance using a modem, you must have:

- A Hayes-compatible modem with the auto-answer feature installed in the server. Compaq ProLiant servers have a management modem slot that allows you to perform remote maintenance over the phone without using an EISA slot.
- A local terminal with VT100 or ANSI terminal capabilities or management PC configured with Compaq Insight Manager 2.0 or later.

This arrangement provides the following capabilities:

- The server can send notification to your pager.
- You can dial-in to the server to perform remote control of Compaq utilities running at the server.

#### **Using a Network Connection**

If you choose to perform remote maintenance over a network, you must have:

- An NVT over IPX or Telnet over IP connection between the server and the management PC.
- An NVT over IPX or Telnet over IP feature configured and enabled on the server's system utility partition.
- Compaq Insight Manager 2.20 or later, or an NVT over IPX or Telnet over IP terminal emulator running on the network.
- Your network connection enables you to perform remote control of Compaq utilities running on the server.

## Compaq Desktop PC Management Technologies

Compaq has forged close alliances with leading vendors of PC LAN management applications and has leveraged server management technology developed in the Compaq Systems Division. These relationships and expertise have enabled Compaq to create hardware designs and management tools to manage the Compaq Deskpro Family of PCs installed on networks.

The following subsections provide a detailed overview of the Compaq Desktop PC management technologies components:

- Intelligent Manageability
- Inventory and Configuration Management
- Fault Management
- Rapid Recovery
- Security Management
- PC LAN Management Software Support

## **Intelligent Manageability**

Intelligent Manageability is the industry-leading desktop management strategy from Compaq that makes networked PCs easier to manage today and tomorrow. Compaq is making enhancements to the basic PC hardware to ensure that the PC is easier to inventory, to troubleshoot, and to protect.

These hardware enhancements are then complemented by a wide range of PC LAN management software. Because this software is integrated and compatible with Intelligent Manageability, it ensures that customers can easily manage Compaq PCs over the network using the customer's preferred PC LAN management products.

### **Inventory and Configuration Management**

Computing devices (PCs, servers, printers) and internetworking devices (routers and bridges) are routinely added to the network to satisfy changing business needs. The dynamic nature of these computing environments requires customers to maintain an accurate inventory of the network and to configure the devices rapidly for optimal operation.

#### **Inventory Management**

Inventory management is a set of capabilities that provide comprehensive hardware and software component identification and configuration reporting to enable inventory and accounting procedures. This component identification (inventory data) is also a prerequisite to distributing data files and software, troubleshooting remote systems, and managing geographically dispersed assets.

The Deskpro Family has integrated AssetControl features which allow administrators to maintain an accurate, up-to-date and centralized inventory of desktop PCs and their components. These features enable businesses to maintain control of their PC assets and allow for effective and accurate software distribution. The features also help streamline service calls because the administrator can provide the service person with fast access to the PC's configuration and history.

#### **Asset Information**

The Deskpro Family features used in conjunction with a Compaq Desktop Management Solutions Partner application make a wealth of useful asset information available to the user and the network administrator. The available information includes:

- The manufacturer, model, and serial number of the PC system, monitor, and hard drive.
- An asset tag and the revision levels of the system board and system ROM.

## **Fault Management**

Fault management is a set of capabilities that provide an early warning of impending component or subsystem failure. This enables you to perform preventive maintenance before the failure.

The current Compaq Fault Management implementation includes provisions for IntelliSafe Hard Drives, environmental fault prevention tracking, and network performance monitoring.

#### IntelliSafe Hard Drive

An IntelliSafe Hard Drive is the next generation IDE/ATA drive and an ANSI standard that was co-designed by Compaq and Conner, Quantum, and Seagate (leading drive manufacturers). IntelliSafe Hard Drives contain enhanced firmware that predicts an impending drive failure. System software, working with the IntelliSafe hard drive, can notify users and LAN administrators of the impending drive failure. When a failure is predicted, the hard drive can be backed up automatically, either locally or over the network (with Windows 95 or Windows NT).

#### **Environmental Fault Prevention Tracking**

This is a hardware and software feature which tracks the internal temperature of the PC and alerts the user and/or network administrator of excessively high internal temperature. This alert enables you to take action before damage occurs to data or internal components. Detection of system-damaging internal temperatures automatically shuts off the power to the PC when the temperature climbs far past the point when the initial warning occurred.

**NOTE**: Environmental fault prevention tracking for Compaq Desktops is available only in a Microsoft Windows 95 or Windows NT operating environment. For servers, it is available for all the Compaq supported operating systems.

#### **Network Performance Monitoring**

Using Compaq Insight Manager, a network administrator can monitor and detect performance degredation of the integrated Network Interface Controller (NIC).

**NOTE**: Network performance monitoring is available only in a Microsoft Windows 95 or Windows NT operating environment.

## **Rapid Recovery**

Rapid Recovery is a set of capabilities that provide notification, rapid identification of faults, and automated restart of failed systems or subsystems so that unplanned downtime is minimized. The current Compaq Fault Management implementation includes provisions for proactive tape backup, flashing of ROM BIOS, and availability of accurate contact information.

#### **Proactive Tape Backup**

This feature provides added data protection from hard drive failure by automatically backing up the PC hard drive contents to a local or server tape drive when an impending failure is detected.

**NOTE**: Proactive tape backup is available only in a Microsoft Windows 95 or Windows NT operating environment.

#### Flash ROM BIOS

This allows quick updating of the system ROM without removing the PC cover. If a system error requires an update of the system ROM, the flash ROM capability of the Deskpro Family provides for a fast recovery by allowing the ROM to be quickly updated via a ROMPaq utility.

#### **Accurate Contact Information**

Accurate desktop PC information provided by AssetControl features allow the network administrator to coordinate service responses for maximum efficiency. When a hardware failure occurs, the AssetControl features enable the network administrator to provide the service person with key information such as the:

- Model and revision level of the PC and components (automatically generated)
- Specific problem, in some cases (automatically generated)
- Location of the PC (manually set)
- Contact person (manually set)

## **Security Management**

Networked PC computing has increased the quantity of easily accessible information that a corporation maintains. Ensuring that this information is accessed only by authorized personnel and that the integrity of the information and PC is maintained is critical in the information age. Security Management is concerned with these issues and is comprised of capabilities to safeguard and protect business-critical data and the PC.

Table 3-2 describes the comprehensive security features to protect critical and confidential data and computing resources. All security management features will be maintained under Microsoft Windows 95.

The Solutions Partners' products provide remote AssetControl support across a wide range of operating environments. This increases the probability that one of the Solutions Partners will have a solution to meet the customer's needs.

Support is available for client PCs using Windows 3.1, Windows NT, and Windows 95. These clients are supported across a wide range of network operating systems, including Windows NT, NetWare, LAN Manager, and LAN Server. Customers must contact specific Solutions Partners to determine the range of support in their particular environment.

#### Compaq Insight Manager and the Desktop Management Solutions Partners Program

When used with the Deskpro Family, Compaq Insight Manager and the Solutions Partners' products are complementary. Compaq Insight Manager functions primarily as the remote hardware and fault management tool. The Solutions Partners' products handle remote inventory management, software distribution, and so on.

Although Insight Manager does provide access to all of the Deskpro Family AssetControl information, Insight Manager is primarily a fault management tool providing both IntelliSafe hard drive and thermal monitoring and alerting. Insight Manager is designed to monitor Compaq hardware only.

The Solutions Partners' products are primarily asset management tools which can provide asset management reports for a range of hardware. The products also might include features such as software distribution, software license metering, and remote workstation control. Although the Solutions Partners'

products are designed to manage almost any PC hardware, only the Deskpro Family provides detailed asset information such as serial numbers and monitor information.

**NOTE**: Customers must contact specific vendors to gain an up-to-date status on individual product capabilities.

## **Compaq Insight Manager Software**

The Compaq Insight Manager Software architecture is typical of other SNMP-management software and comprises the Compaq Insight Manager, Compaq Insight Management Server Agents, the manager software, and Compaq Inventory Collector.

Insight Server Agent software executes on a manageable device such as a server that monitors the fault and performance aspects of the device. These monitored statistics, along with device configuration information, provide data to a management application using the SNMP protocol.

Manager software, such as Insight Manager, provides the user interface to the management features in Compaq servers. You can integrate the Insight Management Server Agents with SNMP-based management platforms to manage Compaq servers.

Inventory Collector software creates Management Information Format (MIF) files from information gathered by the Insight Server Agents software.

## **Compaq Insight Manager**

Compaq developed Insight Manager to make the overwhelming task of server monitoring and server management easy. Insight Manager delivers intelligent monitoring and alerting, remote maintenance, and visual control of the servers in *your* network environment. In the unlikely event of server failures, Insight Manager provides a full spectrum of remote maintenance and control facilities such as system rebooting, system configuration, and system diagnostics.

Insight Manager provides timely server status and the means for remotely controlling servers through the following key features:

Comprehensive Fault Management

Insight Manager provides comprehensive fault management for all major subsystems, including pre-failure alerting for disks, memory, and PentiumPro processors.

■ Integration Management

Insight Manager, together with SmartStart, allows you to effectively deploy and manage configurations throughout the enterprise using the Integration Server and Insight Version Control.

Performance Management

Insight Manager allows you to set performance and capacity thresholds for management variables related to CPU and bus utilization, NIC throughput, logical disk capacity, and more.

Client Management

Insight Manager allows you to manage faults and assets on Compaq Deskpro's.

Asset Management

Insight Manager allows you to export asset information from the Insight Manager database to leading database and spreadsheet applications, making asset management easier than ever.

#### ■ Remote Management

Insight Manager allows you to manage in-band or out-of-band servers online or offline from anywhere.

#### ■ Reporting

Using Automatic Data Collection, Insight Manager allows you to gather historic performance information for graphing or export purposes, helping with upgrade performance.

■ Integration with Enterprise Management Platforms

Insight Manager provides integration with leading management platforms including HP OpenView, IBM NetView, Sun NetManager, and Microsoft Systems Management Server.

#### Additional Compaq Insight Manager features include:

- Ability to configure the primary UPS server with the network address of secondary servers so if an impending power outage occurs all server gracefully shutdown.
- Support for tape drive management on NetWare 3.12 and 4.x as well as Microsoft Windows NT 3.51.
- Ability to recover information from a primary server in the event of a server failure. This feature is known as Standby Recovery Server.
- Support for Windows Internet Naming Service (WINS) and Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP).

Insight Manager adheres to the following standards:

- Management Protocol -- SNMPv1 running over IPX, IP, or PPP
- Compaq Insight Management MIB -- all possible manageable objects specific to Compaq hardware
- Standard Internet MIBs -- support information from MIB-II, Token Ring MIB, and Ethernet MIB

Additionally, Insight Manager stores gathered object information in a Paradox database. You can retrieve this information using Insight Manager or one of several commercially available applications that can access Paradox data.

### **Compaq Insight Management Server Agents**

Insight Management Server Agents consist of server and desktop software that integrates Compaq manageability into SNMP-based management environments. Insight Server Agents perform in-depth monitoring of the fault and performance aspects of the key server subsystems: storage, memory, system processor, network interface, and the environment. Insight Server Agents provide this information, along with server configuration, to SNMP-compliant management applications such as Insight Manager. In addition, Insight Server Agents can generate traps to notify the administrator of significant changes in the fault or performance aspects of the computer operation. With these traps, you can proactively manage the computer, minimize unplanned downtime, and maximize performance.

Insight Server Agents support Microsoft Windows NT, NetWare, SCO OpenServer, UnixWare, IBM OS/2, Banyan VINES, and UNIX. Insight Server Agents include the Compaq Insight Management MIBs, ready for compilation in your SNMP management platform. For more information about the Insight Server Agents for a particular operating system, refer to the appropriate *Compaq Insight Management Server Agents User Guide*.

## Compaq Management Information Base

A management information base (MIB) is a description of a set of manageable objects. A manageable device can implement one or more MIBs, depending on its function. A Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) MIB, which Compaq fully supports, is very similar to a database schema in that it describes both the structure and format of a set of data. The Internet-assigned Compaq enterprise ID is 232.




Figure 3-4. Internet naming tree with Compaq Enterprise ID (232)

Figure 3-4 shows the location of the Compaq enterprise ID in context within the Internet Naming Tree.

The Compaq enterprise ID (232) specifies the location of the Insight MIBs within the Internet Naming Tree. The Insight MIBs are modular, with each subbranch from the Compaq enterprise ID representing a distinct function or subsystem supported by the Insight Server Agents.

Due to the constant changing, updating, or adding of Insight MIBs, Table 3-3 shows a list of only the most current MIBs:

Although the Insight MIBs are organized according to subsystem, your management application can organize the display of the data from the managed devices to convey the most usable presentation. See the Compaq TechNote, *Integrating Compaq Insight Manager with Enterprise Management Platforms*, for more detailed information about Insight MIBs.

## **Compaq Inventory Collector**

The Compaq Inventory Collector program defines the set of manageable objects known to Systems Management Server. These files follow the Management Information Format (MIF), which is a subset of the MIF Specification authored by the DMTF. As a result, the Compaq MIF files, and all MIF files written for Systems Management Server, gather static information only and ignore dynamic information. The DMTF MIF Specification has provisions to obtain dynamic information from a MIF file.

The Compaq MIF files are modular, with each file representing a distinct function or subsystem supported by the Insight Management Server Agents for Microsoft Windows NT. The Compaq Inventory Collector creates the MIF files from the information gathered by the Insight Server Agents. Table 3-4 consist of the MIF files.

Table 3-4 shows all the possible MIF files that might be created by the Inventory Collector. However, every subsystem or function might not be present in a given system. As a result, there may be fewer tables displayed by the Systems Management Server. See Chapter 6, "Integrating the Compaq Inventory Collector," for more information on the Compaq MIF files.

# Integration with Operating System Management

A complete, SNMP-based, server management solution requires developing capabilities that provide server hardware and software management for operating systems and applications. Insight Server Agents take advantage of the extensible SNMP agents provided by Microsoft, Novell, the Santa Cruz Operation (SCO), IBM, and Banyan. Developing agents according to the extensible agent specification ensures that Compaq hardware management technologies integrate with the server and desktop software management.

# Network Management Interoperability

Delivering hardware management technologies that *integrate* with your SNMP-management environment is as important as building the management technologies themselves. Compaq servers can satisfy your management interoperability requirements.

Compaq servers and Compaq Insight Management Software integrate within your preferred management environment. Compaq adheres to network management standards.

Compaq servers provide an extensive set of MIBs which can be used in a full range of environments from a one-server LAN to a globally dispersed enterprise. Because the information is available through SNMP, it is available to point solutions on the LAN for small installations all the way up to complex WAN/LAN enterprises. As your single network LANs grow into larger routed LANs and then into internetworked WANs, you can be sure that Compaq information will grow with you and support your management needs.

## Chapter 4

## **Preinstallation Considerations**

Installing a network management platform is no small task; therefore, this chapter provides you with the minimum hardware and software requirements necessary to properly install Compaq Insight Manager into ManageWise. Before discussing all of the preinstallation considerations, let's discuss ManageWise and its architecture.

## What is ManageWise?

Effective system management requires the interaction of intelligent hardware and firmware with powerful management applications. Compaq servers and desktops are designed with self-diagnostic capabilities that continuously monitor and record the operational status of all key subsystems and components. This information can then be accessed by Compaq Insight Manager or other management tools, such as ManageWise, to provide you with a detailed, integrated view of the operational status of your business-critical network resources.

ManageWise is the network management platform that provides you with an end-to-end management solution for large and small networks. ManageWise provides a global view of an entire network, enabling you to monitor and manage both hardware and software devices on a network. ManageWise discovers and inventories all network devices and constantly monitors for alarms which can pinpoint network problems as well as protect the network from software viruses.

#### 4-2 Preinstallation Considerations

ManageWise supports the Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) which allows easy integration with management applications, such as Compaq Insight Manager.

ManageWise components include:

- NetWare Management System (NMS) 2.0
- NetWare Management Agent (NMA) 1.0
- NetWare LANalyzer Agent 1.0
- LANDesk Manager 1.51
- LANDesk Virus Protect 2.1

For detailed descriptions of each ManageWise component, refer to the ManageWise documentation you received when you purchased the product.

## **Understanding the ManageWise Architecture**

Novell provides their customers with a network and systems management strategy that offers a set of management services collectively known as NetWare Distributed Management Services (NDMS). These services provide scaleable and flexible management capabilities for your entire NetWare environment. When Novell and Intel combined their efforts to integrate their tools and services available for managing networks, the integrated management solution developed became ManageWise.

ManageWise integrates easily into the NDMS architecture because it is comprised of multiple components that reside on different parts of the network. For example, as shown in Table 4-1, the device discovery engine and its database reside on the NetExplorer Server, while the Network Management Map and its database reside on the console. This is an example of how the distributed components of ManageWise align with the NDMS architecture.

Table 4-1 lists the ManageWise components, abbreviations, functions and locations on your network. This table should assist you in a better understanding where each distributed component of ManageWise resides.




Figure 4-1. ManageWise configuration on a typical multiserver network

Figure 4-1 illustrates how ManageWise integrates into the NDMS architecture and displays the component locations in a typical multiserver network configuration.

**NOTE**: Not every server on the network needs to have all of the ManageWise components installed (for example, NXP). However, Compaq Insight Management Agents (CMA) are installed on all servers on the network. Additionally, the LANalyzer Agent is installed (by default) but can be disabled.

## **Preinstallation Considerations**

This section provides you with the information to ensure the ManageWise installation process is smooth and seamless. The topics covered in this section are:

- Hardware and software requirements
- Product installation sequence
- ManageWise considerations
- Compaq Insight Manager considerations

## **Hardware and Software Requirements**

Each management platform has hardware and software requirements. This section discusses those requirements for the ManageWise server, ManageWise console, Compaq Insight Management Agents, and Compaq Insight Manager.

#### ManageWise Server Requirements

The installation program for ManageWise has several requirements for the server. These minimum requirements can vary based on which ManageWise components you install. The baseline for resource requirements is established on a server configured with all of the ManageWise components.

- Compaq server 386/33 MHz
- 10 megabytes of additional RAM (2 megabytes without NetExplorer installed)
- 23 megabytes of disk space
- Network Interface Controller
- NetWare 3.1x, 4.02, or 4.1
- User account with SUPERVISOR rights
- Btrieve 6.10c (available on ManageWise CD-ROM)

#### 4-6 Preinstallation Considerations

#### ManageWise Console Requirements

The installation program for ManageWise has several requirements for the console as well. It is important to have a stable console to ensure the reliability of your system. If the console is unstable before installing ManageWise, the reliability of your management console decreases and could be jeopardized. The ManageWise console must meet the following minimum requirements to ensure stability:

- Compaq desktop 486/33 MHz
- VGA monitor
- 16 megabytes of RAM
- 512 kilobytes conventional memory
- Accessible CD-ROM drive
- 50+ megabytes of disk space
- MS-DOS 6.22 or Novell DOS 7 software
- A network connection
- Microsoft Windows 3.1x
- NetWare Client 1.2 (included on the ManageWise CD-ROM)

**NOTE**: When you install NetWare Client 1.2, *SHARE.EXE* must not be loaded. However, you must load *SHARE.EXE* to install ManageWise properly.

## Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare Requirements

Insight Management Agents for NetWare require the following minimum requirements:

- Compaq server
- 1 megabyte of reserved disk space
- NetWare 3.1x, 4.02, or 4.1

**NOTE:** Agents running on NetWare 3.11 need the *AFTER311.NLM* file loaded to operate.

#### **Compaq Insight Manager Requirements**

The following requirements are necessary to install Compaq Insight Manager on a management PC running Windows 3.1:

- 8 megabytes of RAM (minimum)
- 27 megabytes of reserved disk space
   (8 megabytes for programs, 19 megabytes for databases)
- VGA graphics or better
- Network Interface Controller Compatible with NetWare Open Datalink Interface (ODI)
- Microsoft Windows 3.1 running in enhanced mode

## **Product Installation Sequence**

The process for installing the complete management platform (ManageWise wtih Compaq Insight Manager) is quite simple. However, it is important to install each product in the proper sequence, because each product requires the previous one for a proper installation. Table 4-2 lists the correct product installation sequence.

Table 4-2 Product Installation Sequence

**NOTE**: Be sure to designate your first ManageWise server as the NetExplorer Server. The NetExplorer Manager must connect to the NetExplorer Server in order to download the topological information ManageWise requires to build the Network Management Map.

## **ManageWise Considerations**

Once you have decided to use ManageWise on your network there are some informational tips as well as prerequisites you need to consider before you start the installation process. These considerations include topics such as:

- Accessing a CD-ROM locally or across the network
- Loading the *SHARE.EXE* file

- Using the ManageWise License Diskette
- Connecting to the NetExplorer server
- Discovery mechanisms

#### Accessing a CD-ROM Locally or Across the Network

To install ManageWise, you need access to a CD-ROM drive either locally or across the network. To access the ManageWise CD locally, place the ManageWise CD into the CD-ROM drive. To access the ManageWise CD across the network, follow these steps:

- Place the ManageWise CD into the CD-ROM drive on the targeted File Server.
- 2. Mount the CD-ROM as a volume from the File Server Console.
- 3. Map a drive connection to that volume, then start the installation program.

#### Loading the SHARE.EXE File

When you install the NetWare Client, do not load the *SHARE.EXE* file into memory. However, when you are ready to install ManageWise, load *SHARE.EXE* into memory before launching Windows. After completing this task, you can start the ManageWise and Insight Manager installation process.

**NOTE**: ManageWise and Insight Manager require you to load the *SHARE.EXE* file, so they can properly access their databases.

#### **Using the ManageWise License Diskette**

During the server setup portion of the ManageWise installation, the program prompts you for the ManageWise License Diskette. You need this diskette to continue the installation. The installation program requires this diskette to serialize all of the ManageWise components on the server.

### Connecting to the NetExplorer Server

During the ManageWise Console installation process, the program requires a ManageWise server to be up and running. At this time, the installation program prompts you for the name of the ManageWise NetExplorer Server responsible for providing topological information to the console. The installation program uses this information to:

- Verify the NetExplorer Server exists.
- Confirm the installation of ManageWise on the NetExplorer Server.

**NOTE**: If the installation program cannot confirm this information, you cannot continue with the console installation.

#### **Discovery Mechanisms**

ManageWise uses a combination of discovery mechanisms to identify all devices on the network. This combination is made up of the NetWare protocol, called the Service Advertising Protocol (SAP), and a transient rule.

SAP is a NetWare protocol used to identify the services and addresses of servers attached to the network. The responses are used to update a table in the router known as the Server Information Table.

The transient rule determines which application, such as Insight Manager or NetWare Management Agents, will be the default action when double clicking on that node. The transient rule for Insight Manager is that it first launches to the NetWare Management Agents, then you can access Insight Manager.

Compaq Insight Management Agents and NetWare Management Agents SAP identifications are:

- Compaq SAP ID 372 (0x174)
- Novell SAP ID 563 (0x233)

### **Compaq Insight Manager Considerations**

The following section discusses the recommendation of installing ManageWise before you install Insight Manager.

### Installing ManageWise Before Insight Manager

Install ManageWise before you install Insight Manager; otherwise, Insight Manager installs as a standalone application and does not integrate with ManageWise.

If you have installed Insight Manager before ManageWise, the option for installing ManageWise or NMS support (shown below) does not appear during the Insight Manager Installation. To correct this, abort the Compaq Insight Manager installation and verify that ManageWise is installed and running on your machine. Once you have done this, proceed with the Insight Manager installation.

Install Compaq Insight Manager 2.61
Install ManageWise or NMS Support
Install Asynchronous Management

## Why Use the Compaq Management Information Base?

The Compaq Insight Management Agents Management Information Bases (MIBs) provide the base structure for managing Compaq hardware. Compaq provides a set of MIBs that can be compiled into any SNMP compliant management platform, such as ManageWise. With these MIBs, ManageWise can understand Compaq SNMP traps and add valuable messages to the ManageWise alarm monitor log.

Compaq MIB items show up as SNMP events for configuration of the alarm dispositions. This means you can configure how ManageWise processes and logs the SNMP trap and you can also launch an application.

## Chapter 5

# **Integrating Compaq Insight Manager with ManageWise**

This chapter discusses installing ManageWise on your server and on your console, then integrating Compaq Insight Manager to work in conjunction with ManageWise.

# Installing ManageWise on Your Server

To install ManageWise on your server, follow these steps:

- 1. Place the ManageWise CD into the CD-ROM drive.
- 2. Start Windows, then select  $File \rightarrow Run$  from the Program Manager menu.
- 3. Type [CD drive]:\SETUP, then select *OK* and after a few seconds the ManageWise Setup Screen appears.
- 4. Select *Set Up Server* to configure a NetExplorer server on the network. A NetExplorer server must be set up on your network before you can proceed to set up the ManageWise console.
  - IMPORTANT: During the planning stage of your ManageWise installation, you must designate at least one server on the network as the NetExplorer Server. This allows ManageWise to automatically discover each device on the network.
- 5. Insert the ManageWise License diskette into the diskette drive and select *OK*.

**NOTE:** If you are going to install ManageWise on more than one server, you need an additional ManageWise License diskette for each additional server.

#### 5-2 Integrating Compag Insight Manager with ManageWise

6. Select a drive on the ManageWise Server Target Information Screen that is mapped to the SYS Volume on the server on which you want to install ManageWise. When you have done this, select the *Install* button to proceed with the installation.

**NOTE:** If you currently do not have a drive mapped to this SYS volume, select the *Network* button to create a mapping to that drive. Also, if you choose an incorrect volume, you will receive an incorrect volume error message. To correct the error, select the proper drive.

- 7. Select *Install NetExplorer on this server* only if you want this server to be the NetExplorer server. Select *Continue* to proceed.
- 8. Enter a password for the new NETMAN account you are about to create, confirm the password, and select *Continue*.

**NOTE:** ManageWise uses the NETMAN account information to verify access rights during any management sessions.

Now that you have created a new NETMAN account, the ManageWise installation process is next. ManageWise installs the following management tools during installation:

- □ NetWare Management System 2.0
- □ NMS 2.0c patch
- □ NetWare Management Agent 1.0
- □ NetWare LANalyzer Agent 1.0
- □ LANDesk Manager 1.51
- □ LANDesk Virus Protect 2.1

**NOTE:** During the ManageWise installation if you have any outdated files, ManageWise prompts you to update them.

- 9. Select the *Accept* button so ManageWise can modify the System Login Script and the *AUTOEXEC.NCF* files for LANDesk Manager.
- 10. Complete the *Server To Do List*. This list must be completed to enable all of the components just installed on your server. Once you have completed this list, select *Done*.
  - **IMPORTANT:** Do not reboot the server to run NetExplorer until you install the Compaq Insight Management Agents on each server you want to manage. This allows the NetExplorer to recognize these servers as Compaq manageable devices.

# Installing ManageWise on Your Console

To continue the ManageWise installation, you must next set up the console. Because you have already set up your server, the installation program returns you to the ManageWise Setup menu. Use the following steps to set up your ManageWise console:

- 1. Select *Set Up Console*, then place the ManageWise License diskette into the diskette drive and select *OK*.
  - The installation program prompts you for this diskette to verify your licensed user count (the amount of users you are licensed for) and serial number so that it can serialize the software.
- 2. Select the drive mapped to the root of the SYS Volume on which you installed ManageWise, then select *Install*.
- 3. Select the size of your network (the approximate number of nodes in your network), then choose *OK*. The average size for a medium network is approximately 100 to 1000 nodes.

4. Enter your name and Company, then select *Continue*. The console installation program prompts you to verify this information.

5. Enter the name of the NetExplorer Server, then select *OK*.


**NOTE:** The default server name for your network might not be the designated NetExplorer Server. If the server name is not the NetExplorer Server, change it now.

Just before the NMS console is installed, the installation program prompts you to choose options such as, *Installing the NMS tutorials* and *Installing TCP/IP software*.

6. Select *Installing TCP/IP software* if you use TCP/IP on your network, then select *OK*.

**NOTE:** The installation program might modify some of your configuration files such as the *AUTOEXEC.BAT, CONFIG.SYS, SYSTEM.INI, WIN.INI*, and the *NET.CFG* files. The system saves the old filename with the extension *.NMS*.

7. Accept or Deny changes to your *AUTOEXEC.BAT* and *SYSTEM.INI* files. The console installation program prompts you for this information. If you accept *all* changes, the console installation begins.



- 8. Select a time zone.
- 9. Select *OK* and the LANDesk Virus Protect Installation program launches.
- 10. Complete the *Console To Do List*. This list must be completed to enable all of the components just installed on your server. Once you have completed this list, select *Done*.

You have successfully completed your ManageWise installation.

To fully comprehend the integration process that occurs when Insight Manager integrates into ManageWise, you need to understand the differences between ManageWise and the NetWare Management System (NMS).

## ManageWise and NetWare Management System Differences

The technological differences between the base platform of ManageWise and NetWare Management System (NMS) are minimal. ManageWise uses NMS 2.0c as its base platform. Novell combined NMS 2.0c with additional features added from other software packages to provide a complete management solution all in one box. The software packages integrated with NMS to create ManageWise include:

- NetWare Management Agent 1.0
- NetWare LANalyzer Agent 1.0
- Intel LANDesk Manager 1.51
- Intel LANDesk Virus Protect 2.1

Even though ManageWise is a combination of these software packages and NMS, each program still exists under its original directory structure. For example, if you install ManageWise, each product directory appears the same as if you installed each product individually. There is only one slight modification. The ManageWise directory appears as the main directory instead of NMS or LANDesk Manager.




Figure 5-1. The ManageWise directory structure

This is how the integration process of all these packages work together. To make all of these products appear as one, the console directory structure has been modified. Rather than having two separate subdirectories, one for NMS and one for LANDesk Manager, there is only one main directory for ManageWise. Located under the ManageWise main directory are the subdirectories for NMS and LANDesk Manager. Refer to Figure 5-1 for an overall view of the ManageWise directory structure and Table 5-1 for descriptions for each abbreviation.

By having LANDesk Manager and LANDesk Virus Protect integrated into NMS 2.0c to create ManageWise, you now have all of the basic tools necessary to manage any NetWare LAN from end-to-end.

## Installing Compaq Insight Management Agents

This section describes the installation procedure for installing the Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare. Read the installation instructions completely before trying to install the software.

**NOTE**: If you have already installed the Compaq Insight Management Agents by using SmartStart, skip to "Setting up the SNMP System Description and Trap Destinations."

The *Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare* diskette provides the installation file, *CPQFPYIN.NCF*, and the installation utility, *CPQAGIN.NLM*, to install and configure the Insight Management Agents for NetWare on a NetWare Server. From a NetWare server console, follow these steps:

1. Insert the *Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare* diskette into diskette drive. At the Command Console, type:

A:\COMPAQ\CPQFPYIN

2. Select *Install NetWare Agents from Diskette* to install or upgrade Insight Management Agents. The installation program lists the agents to be loaded on to your NetWare Partition.

**NOTE:** Online help is available throughout the installation by pressing **F1**.

3. Highlight the agent you want loaded, then select *Yes* or *No*. You can then move the cursor to select additional agents or save the information and continue.

**NOTE:** You must install CPQBSSA for Insight Manager to recognize that the server is manageable.

4. Select the parameters you want to configure the agents. They include:

☐ SNMP Monitor and Control support (community and monitor strings)	
☐ SNMP Set support	
☐ Insight Manager Remote Server Reboot	
□ Polling Interval

**NOTE:** If you have INETCFG on your system, you must use INETCFG to change the SNMP Community and Monitor strings.

The screens that follow depend on the individual agents installed:

- CPQBSSA can be configured to issue or not issue NetWare SAP packets, and monitor or not monitor Ethernet and Token Ring information.
- CPQTHRSA can be configured for the maximum number of threshold entries to support.

**NOTE:** If you are installing Insight Management Agents on a NetWare 3.11 server, you must manually install the correct versions of *SNMP.NLM*, *AFTER311.NLM*, and *TCPIP.NLM*. These files are included on the *Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare* diskette.

Table 5-2 lists the Insight Management Agents (NLMs) delivered with the v2.61 software release.

# **Setting Up the SNMP System Description and Trap Destinations**

The final step to installing the Insight Management Agents is to update the *SNMP.CFG* and *TRAPTARG.CFG* files to match your server and network management configuration.

Sample configuration files, SNMP.CFG and TRAPTARG.CFG, are in the \NOVELL\ETC directory of the Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare diskette. If your server does not have these files in the SYS:ETC directory, copy the sample files from the NetWare diskette to your server.

#### Editing the SNMP.CFG File

The SNMP.CFG is an ASCII text file that provides the SNMP.NLM with server name, hardware, location, and contact information. The SNMP.CFG is a sample and should be edited to reflect the correct information about your installation.

**NOTE**: The *SNMP.NLM* allows configuration of some MIB-II system identification information with the *SNMP.CFG* file. You must have the *SNMP.CFG* file in the SYS:ETC directory when the *SNMP.NLM* is loaded for proper configuration of the identification information.

#### Editing the TRAPTARG.CFG File

The sample *TRAPTARG.CFG* file provides the *SNMP.NLM* with information about where to send alarm information.

The *TRAPTARG.CFG* is an ASCII text file that lists the addresses of management console that should be alerted when the SNMP Insight Management Agents detect an important event. The *TRAPTARG.CFG* in SYS:ETC is a sample. Edit the file to reflect the correct information. Follow the instructions provided in the sample *TRAPTARG.CFG* file to update this file to match your environment configuration. Be sure to place the alarm destination address under the appropriate protocol section and to indent each address with at least one space.

To help you determine the network address of your management PC when using IPX, you can execute the USERLIST program. At the DOS prompt, type:

USERLIST /A

For NetWare 4, type:

NLIST USER /A

A list of PCs logged into the server and their addresses is displayed. The entry with an asterisk preceding the user name is the PC you are using. Both the network address and the node address given by USERLIST are needed by the *TRAPTARG.CFG* file.

**NOTE**: If you are using Insight Manager, verify that the network address of the management PC where Insight Manager runs is included in *TRAPTARG.CFG* file.

One method for ensuring that you have the proper address configured is to use Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare installation program to generate a test trap. To do this, use the option *Initiate Test Trap* located on the main Agent Options window of the installation program. This option generates and sends a test trap to any address(es) specified in the *TRAPTARG.CFG* file.

## Updating SNMP Support for NetWare 3.11

Servers with NetWare 3.11 installed might require you to update the SNMP support files located in the system directory of the server. Table 5-3 lists the minimum versions of SNMP support files required by the Insight Management Agents.

Table 5-3 SNMP Support Files

NLM File	Version	Date
SNMP.NLM	2.08 or later	4/06/93
AFTER311.NLM	2.00a or later	1/26/93
TCPIP.NLM	2.02l or later	2/20/93

**NOTE**: The NLM dates and versions mentioned in Table 5-3 are the minimum required for NetWare 3.11. They are not meant to specify the latest versions of these NLMs.

To update the NetWare 3.11 SNMP support files, follow these steps:

1. Rename the existing SNMP support files listed in Table 5-3 in the SYS:SYSTEM directory of the NetWare server. Do this so the files will not be written over or deleted. For example:

RENAME SNMP.NLM SNMPOLD.NLM



**CAUTION:** Do not copy the files on the *Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare* diskette directly over the SNMP support files already installed on your system.

2. Copy the files in the \NOVELL\NW311\SYSTEM directory of the *Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare* diskette into the \SYSTEM directory of the NetWare server. For example:

COPY A:\NOVELL\NW311\SYSTEM\\*.\* F:\SYSTEM\\*.\*

- 3. Create a SYS:ETC directory on the server if one does not already exist.
- 4. If your server does not already have the *SNMP.CFG* and *TRAPTARG.CFG* files installed and updated for your particular configuration, copy the sample files in the \NOVELL\ETC directory of the *Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare* diskette to the SYS:ETC directory of the NetWare server. For example:

COPY A:\NOVELL\ETC\\*.\* F:\ETC\\*.\*

Now you are finished updating of the NetWare 3.11 SNMP support files.

# SNMP Monitor and Control Community Strings

SNMP defines a community as a relationship between an SNMP agent and one or more SNMP managers. When SNMP messages are exchanged, they contain two parts:

- A community name and information to validate the sending SNMP entity as a member of an identified community
- Data

The community name defines the authentication mechanism.

The *SNMP.NLM* allows you to specify two different user communities on the command line: the monitor community and the control community. The monitor community provides access to all SNMP attributes with read-only access. The control community provides read-write access or SET privileges.

To enable Insight Manager to perform SET operations on server parameters on a NetWare server, you must load the *SNMP.NLM* with a community string specified for the control community. If the *SNMP.NLM* is loaded without specifying either community, it uses *public* as a default monitor community and disables the control community. This default condition means that no read-write access is allowed; therefore, no SNMP SET commands will function.

**NOTE**: This is the same default as Compaq Insight Manager. If you enter a different community string, you must also enter it on the management PC that is responsible for the server. To change the community string in Insight Manager, select the *Server Setup* button from the Task List Window. This opens the Server Setup Window, where the community string can be set. For more information on community strings, refer to the *Compaq Insight Manager User Guide*.

The community string usage is described below:

#### ■ Monitor Community

This community string has a 32-character maximum which is to be used for read-only access to the SNMP attributes. If you do not specify the MONITOR COMMUNITY parameter, the *SNMP.NLM* uses *public* as the default community string. Since there will always be a MONITOR COMMUNITY string, there will always be read-only access. Community names are case-sensitive.

#### ■ Control Community

This community string has a 32-character maximum which is to be used for read/write access to the SNMP attributes. If the CONTROL COMMUNITY parameter is not specified, the *SNMP.NLM* disables all read-write access. Community names are case-sensitive.

Table 5-4 provides some examples on providing access to the following communities:

Table 5-4
NetWare SNMP Community Access Configuration Examples

Access Rights	Community String
Read-only	Monitor = HELPDESK Control = <blank></blank>
Read-only and Read/Write	Monitor = HELPDESK Control = ADMIN
Read/Write	Monitor = <any string=""> Control = ADMIN</any>

**NOTE**: For configuring SNMP access for other operating systems, refer to the *Compaq Insight Management Agents User Guide* for each operating system.



**CAUTION:** SNMP.NLM must be loaded before the TCPIP.NLM in the AUTOEXEC.NCF file to enable set commands or to change the default community string parameters. If you do not load SNMP.NLM before TCPIP.NLM, the TCPIP.NLM file automatically loads the SNMP.NLM with default command line parameters and a subsequent LOAD command for the SNMP.NLM fails.

For information on installing and configuring the Compaq Insight Management Agents for Microsoft Windows NT, SCO UNIX, UnixWare, and IBM OS/2, refer to the *Compaq Insight Management Agents User Guide* for each operating system.



**IMPORTANT:** To activate the Compaq Insight Management Agents and the NetExplorer, you must bring down and reboot the server.

## **Installing Compaq Insight Manager**

To configure ManageWise for use with Insight Manager, follow these steps:

Start Windows.



**IMPORTANT:** If you are currently running ManageWise and you continue with the Insight Manager installation, the installation program will shut down all ManageWise components.

- 2. Place the SmartStart CD into the CD-ROM drive or the Insight Manager Diskette #1 into the diskette drive.
- 3. Select  $File \rightarrow Run$  from the Program Manager menu.
- 4. Type [cd drive]:\CIM\INSTALL\SETUP or [diskette drive]:\SETUP, then select *OK*. After a few seconds, the installation program displays a registration window.
- 5. Fill in the registration information and select the *Continue* button.

6. Select *OK* on the confirmation window to confirm the registration information or select *Retry* to change the registration information.

**IMPORTANT:** If you have a previous version of Insight Manager installed, the installation program notifies you that an old version exists and will be unusable if you continue with the installation.

- 7. Select *OK* to continue with the installation and upgrade your previous version or *Cancel* to quit the installation. If you choose to Cancel, the installation program will abort and preserve your previous version of Insight Manager.
- 8. Select the checkbox, *Install Compaq Insight Manager 2.61* and *Install ManageWise or NMS Support*, then select *OK* to continue. Do not select the option to install Asynchronous Management.
  - ☐ Install Compaq Insight Manager 2.61
  - ☐ Install ManageWise or NMS Support
  - ☐ Install Asynchronous Management

**IMPORTANT:** Asynchronous Management is not supported when Insight Manager is installed under ManageWise.

- 9. Enter the directory path where you want to install Compaq Insight Manager 2.61. Fill in the information and select *OK* to continue.
- 10. Enter the location of your *TCPIP.EXE* and *VTCPIP.386* files. Provide the correct path to these files and select *OK*. Select *Cancel* if you do not use the TCPIP stack.
- 11. Confirm your installation selections, then select *OK* to continue, *Go Back* to change the installation settings, or *Exit Setup* to abort the installation.

12. Upgrade your databases and forms, if necessary, by selecting the appropriate boxes, then select *OK* to continue or *Cancel* if you do not want to update your databases.

**NOTE:** The installation program prompts you to update your databases and forms only if you are upgrading an older version of Insight Manager. Also, Insight Manager backs up the currently installed database.

- 13. Enter the location where you want to install the Compaq Insight Manager program group and select *OK*.
- 14. Verify all of the installation options you have chosen during the Insight Manager Setup, then select *OK* to proceed with the installation.

The Insight Manager installation is now complete. Follow these steps to complete the integration process.

- 1. Use the ManageWise Database Administration Tool (or the Database Reset Tool) to reset your database.
- 2. Edit your *AUTOEXEC.BAT* file if you had a previous version of Insight Manager installed. To do this, open the file and remove any references to the previous Insight Manager path. Also Setup automatically adds the *SHARE.EXE* file and the location of the current version of Insight Manager to the end of the PATH statement.

**NOTE:** In MS-DOS, the PATH statement cannot exceed 128 characters. If your PATH statement exceeds this length, you must remove some items to allow room for the Insight Manager directory.

3. Restart the management PC before running Insight Manager. Once you have done this, your installation of Compaq Insight Manager under ManageWise is complete.

**IMPORTANT:** Be sure to run the NetExplorer Manager so that the console database is updated with the NMS Discovery information from the NetExplorer server. This database contains information on the newly configured Compaq servers. Make sure the Insight Management Agents are running properly before you run the NetExplorer Manager.

# **Installing and Compiling the Compaq MIBs into ManageWise**

This section assumes that you have the ManageWise management PC running successfully. If this is a new installation, your ManageWise management PC needs to complete the automatic discovery process for your network. Depending on your network, this process can take up to several hours.

## Integrating the Compaq Insight MIB Files

Insight MIBs can integrate with a ManageWise management PC, allowing you to browse the Insight MIB on any server running the Insight Management Agents. ManageWise can also interpret Insight MIB traps that are sent by the servers running Insight Management Agents.

To integrate Insight MIB files with a ManageWise management PC, follow these steps:

- 1. Insert the Insight MIBs diskette into the diskette drive of the ManageWise management PC.
- 2. Change to the MW\NMS\SNMPMIBS\CURRENT directory on the drive where ManageWise is installed. For example:
  - C:> CD\MW\NMS\SNMPMIBS\CURRENT
- 3. Copy all MIB files from the diskette drive to the current directory. For example:
  - COPY A:\CPQ\_MIB\\*.MIB
- 4. Start Windows and open the ManageWise console.
- 5. Select the SNMP MIB Compiler option from the Tools menu.

6. Select *Compile* to compile all the MIB files in the CURRENT directory of the ManageWise database.

7. Select *Exit* to exit the SNMP MIB Compiler. Do this at the end of the compile process.

This ends the MIB integration procedure for ManageWise.

## **Configuring ManageWise Alarm Dispositions**




Figure 5-2. Configuring alarm dispositions

You can view Compaq alarms by selecting the *Fault* option, followed by *Alarm Disposition* on the menu bar and change the Alarm Family list box to *SNMP*. These alarms, or traps, have been preconfigured with Severity (critical, major, minor, warning, or unknown) and Object State (operational, degraded, or non-operational). Figure 5-2 illustrates an example of alarm dispositions.

You have the option of launching a program for each trap or alarm. For example, when the ManageWise management PC receives a CPQ SCSI Logical Drive Status Change alarm, it indicates a status change to the logical drive configuration. If the logical drive configuration includes fault tolerance (RAID 2, RAID 4, or RAID 5), it can still operate, but a problem exists that requires your attention. By default, an alarm disposition appears:

- On the network management map.
- In the Alarm Monitor view.
- Printed and viewed in the Alarm Report.

In addition to logging the alarm, you can have the management PC:

- Beep.
- Display a message.
- Launch an application when the alarm occurs.

If you want to launch an application when an alarm occurs, select the *Launch Programs* box and type the command line for the application. The command line can contain batch or executable files.

The following are customized alarm configurations that you can specify:

- If you receive the CPQ SCSI Logical Drive Status Change alarm, you can run a batch file that contains the NetWare SEND command that sends a specific message to the ADMIN group.
- If you have a problem with a specific server, you can launch a communications application with a script to call a beeper number and leave a numerical message that indicates the problem.

You can configure each alarm differently to meet your specific needs. Refer to the *ManageWise 1.0 NetWare Management System Software: Getting Started* document for more information on alarm management.

When you customize alarms for your configuration, ManageWise can interpret the alarms sent by Compaq servers. You can also use the SNMP MIB Browser to build profiles to query Insight MIB objects on Compaq servers.

### Compaq Insight Manager Version Differences

Compaq maintains its commitment to network management by continually enhancing its integration with ManageWise. One of the enhancements in Compaq Insight Manager (versions 2.5 through 2.61) is having the knowledge of the ManageWise 1.0 platform. ManageWise 1.0 introduces integration issues that were not present in previous versions of NMS. Two of these issues are:

- TCP/IP version required by Insight Manager for Remote Control
- Btrieve patch required by Insight Manager

#### TCP/IP Version for Remote Control

The version of TCP/IP required by Insight Manager for its Remote Control feature is newer than the version shipped with ManageWise. Compaq Insight Manager can now verify the version of TCP/IP that is currently being used. Insight Manager will then perform the upgrade if necessary.

# **Configuring Btrieve for Earlier Versions of Insight Manager**

Insight Manager and the ManageWise Inventory Manager use two different versions of Btrieve. Insight Manager uses version 5.10 and ManageWise uses version 6.10. These two versions of Btrieve use the same naming convention for their DLL files, but one is for local databases (client-based) and the other is for remote databases (client/server). Having the same name for each DLL file causes incompatibility between the two applications. The Compaq Insight Manager 2.5 (or later) installation program applies a Btrieve patch allowing the local version of Btrieve on Insight Manager to run concurrently with other applications that use the remote version of Btrieve.

**IMPORTANT:** Compaq Insight Manager 2.5 or later automatically configures Btrieve to properly run with ManageWise.

If you do not have at least Compaq Insight Manager 2.5, perform the following procedures to allow compatibility between the two applications.

1. Obtain this Windows utility from CompuServe by downloading the self-extracting ZIP file, *BT515.EXE*, from the Current Upgrades Library located in the Btrieve Technologies Forum.

**NOTE**: *BT515.EXE* contains the self-extracting ZIP file *BTRREQ.EXE*.

- 2. Extract WNDBCNVT.EXE from BTRREQ.EXE.
- 3. Start Windows after making sure Insight Manager is not running.
- 4. Select *Run* from Program Manager's File menu, then type *WNDBCNVT.EXE* and select *OK*.
- 5. Select *Convert* from the Convert menu item and enter the path where Insight Manager is installed, then select *OK*.

This conversion program saves the WBTRCALL.DLL file as WBTRCALL.SAV, then the program creates the WBTRLOCL.DLL file in the Insight Manager directory.

After this conversion process is complete, Btrieve will run in both local and remote modes.

- 6. Exit Windows.
- 7. Copy (from the DOS prompt) the newly created WBTRLOCL.DLL file from the Insight Manager directory to the LANDesk Manager directory. For example:

COPY C:\INSIGHT\WBTRLOCL.DLL C:\MW\LDT

8. Copy the Client/Server Btrieve files, *WBTRCALL.DLL* and *BTRVRES.DLL*, from the LANDesk Manager directory to the Insight Manager directory as follows:

COPY C:\MW\LDT\WBTRCALL.DLL C:\INSIGHT COPY C:\MW\LDT\WBTRVRES.DLL C:\INSIGHT

9. Enable access to the local Btrieve files. By default, the Windows Requester is not configured for accessing files locally. From the Windows directory, open the *NOVDB.INI* file by typing:

**EDIT NOVDB.INI** 

**NOTE**: The *NOVDB.INI* file might be called *BTI.INI*.

10. Set the local profile string in the [brequestDPMI] section to *Yes*. For example:

[brequestDPMI]

local=Yes; allow access to Client-Only Btrieve DLL

11. Press **Alt** + **F** to open the File menu, save changes, and exit the *NOVDB.INI* or *BTI.INI* file.

Upon completion of this procedure, both applications should run properly.

# Using Compaq Insight Manager with ManageWise

This section describes how to launch Compaq Insight Manager when running it under ManageWise. This section also describes the differences between the snap-in version and the standalone version of Insight Manager.

# Launching Insight Manager from ManageWise

Once you integrate Insight Manager with ManageWise, you can launch Insight Manager by using the Compaq server icon, NetWare server icon, or the Insight Manager option located under the Tools menu.

## Launching Insight Manager Using the Compaq Server Icon

To launch Insight Manager from ManageWise using the Compaq server icon, follow these steps:




Figure 5-3. Network management map after integration

1. Select a Compaq managed server icon from the ManageWise network management map as shown in Figure 5-3.

2. Click again to launch Insight Manager to the designated Compaq server.

## Launching Insight Manager Using the NetWare Server Icon

To launch Insight Manager from ManageWise using the NetWare server icon, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the NetWare server icon located on the network management map shown in Figure 5-3.
  - This opens the NetWare Server Configuration window. This is only for servers managed by both Insight Manager and ManageWise.
- 2. Select the Compaq server icon at the bottom of the NetWare Server Configuration window to launch Insight Manager.

## Launching Insight Manager Using the Tools Menu

To launch Insight Manager from ManageWise using the Tools menu, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the designated server located on the network management map shown in Figure 5-3.
- 2. Select the Insight Manager option from the Tools menu. This launches Insight Manager.

# Differences Between Insight Manager Snap-In Application and Standalone

The standalone version of Insight Manager and Insight Manager under ManageWise are configured differently. Once you integrate Insight Manager with ManageWise, you no longer use the standalone version of Insight Manager. The snap-in application that is used under ManageWise does not contain the following items:

- The Server List is not available.
  - Since Insight Manager is launched from ManageWise or NMS, the server list and the discovery process are provided by the platform.
- The Server Inaccessible menu item from the Alarms menu is not available.
  - The polling process that detects inaccessible servers is not available under the platform, so the alarms will not be generated.
- The Insight Manager program icon is not installed in the Insight Manager program group.
- The Server and Task List configuration options are not available.
- Insight Asynchronous Management is not supported because the platform does not support PPP.

## Installing Insight Manager with the Server List

Once the integration process of Insight Manager and ManageWise takes place, the Insight Manager icon does not appear in the Compaq Insight Manager program group, as shown in Figure 5-4. However, the Compaq Insight Manager program group for the standalone application contains the Insight Manager program icon.



**Figure 5-4.** The Compaq Insight Manager program group after integration

After integrating the two products, ManageWise launches Insight Manager when you select a server from the network management map. You cannot view the Insight Manager Server List once integration occurs. Nevertheless, you can maintain the integration of Insight Manager into ManageWise and also have the Insight Manager Server List. However, installing the Server List causes additional network polling by Insight Manager.

To install Insight Manager with the Server List, follow these steps.

- 1. Install Insight Manager again.
- 2. Select only the *Install Compaq Insight Manager 2.61* option. Choose the same directory used in the previous install of Insight Manager.

Also do not choose *Install ManageWise or NMS Support* or the option *Install Asynchronous Management*.

□ Install Compaq Insight Manager 2.61
 □ Install ManageWise or NMS Support
 □ Install Asynchronous Management

Now when Insight Manager is launched from ManageWise, Insight Manager launches to the correct server, but also displays the list of servers on the network.

### Modifying the Task List Window Setup

When Insight Manager is integrated into ManageWise, the menu item to modify the task list window setup is not available; therefore, the task list window remains the top window by default. This might not be your preference. You can change this setting by modifying the *CIM20.INI* file.

To modify the task list window setup, follow these steps:

- 1. Exit Insight Manager.
- 2. Open the CIM20.INI file found in the default Windows directory.
- 3. Modify the parameter ServerTListOnTop in the [Task Manager] section of the INI file to look like the following:
  - ServerTListOnTop=0
- 4. Save, then exit the CIM20.INI file.
- 5. Start Insight Manager again.

## Chapter 6

## **Performance Recommendations**

This chapter discusses several performance recommendations that help maximize the performance of Insight Manager and ManageWise while minimizing the load put on the network by the platform. These Compaq recommendations consist of discussions on performance tuning issues such as implementing configuration modifications to specific files and architectural implementation of management agents.

## The ManageWise Server

There are several configuration modifications you can make to enhance the performance of the ManageWise server. Some of these modifications require editing files while others require decisions on which programs to load and how to configure them. The following sections discuss the most prevalent configuration modifications to enhance the performance of your ManageWise server.

### Designating Only One NetExplorer Server

To help maximize the performance of ManageWise and Insight Manager, designate only one NetExplorer server per network. The NetExplorer server can discover entire networks, including LANs and WANs. The NetExplorer engine requires approximately 8 megabytes of RAM. By not installing the NetExplorer on every ManageWise server, you can allocate this memory for cache buffers. The NetExplorer engine also can cause slow performance due to the polling cycles for discovering the network.

!

**IMPORTANT:** Because the NetExplorer server can discover all devices within the entire network and it requires a large amount of resources, Compaq recommends not installing it on every server on which you are going to run ManageWise. However, if you manage a regional area WAN, designate one NetExplorer server for each region on your network.

### **Limiting NetExplorer Server Discovery**

Because the NetExplorer's function is to discover all devices within an entire network, you need to specify or limit these discovery areas to only those networks you want to monitor. By limiting the NetExplorer's scope, you can:

- Reduce traffic on the network.
- Limit the view of the network.
- Discover the desired IP and IPX network segments

IPX scoping allows you to selectively choose which IPX network(s) the autodiscovery process discovers. By default, the IPX discovery finds all IPX networks in your IPX internetwork. Thus, IPX scoping reduces the number of IPX networks discovered and displayed in the ManageWise Internet Logical Map. Setting up IPX scoping does not completely eliminate the NetExplorer IPX traffic outside the specified networks. IPX discovery periodically tries to see whether there are any new IPX addresses that match one of the specified networks.

IP scoping allows you to expand the discovery of your IP networks. The IP discovery default mode is to discover an entire IP network where the NetExplorer is directly attached, as defined by the class of the IP network. IP scoping extends the discovery of additional IP networks by adding IP network addresses to the *NXPIP.INI* file. You must manually create and place the *NXPIP.INI* file in the following directory:

SYS:\NMDISK

If your IP network is connected to the Internet, use caution with the IP scoping feature because you might unintentionally start discovering the Internet.

For more information on limiting the NetExplorer server scope, refer to the *ManageWise 1.0 Setup Guide* document available from Novell, or refer to the sample *NXPIP.INI* and *NXPIPX.INI* files listed in the next two sections of this chapter.

For more information on the discovery process of the NetExplorer server, refer to the *ManageWise 1.0 NetExplorer Discovery System* document available from Novell.

### Sample NXPIPX.INI File

The following sample *NXPIPX.INI* file illustrates how to limit the NetExplorer's discovery to one set of servers on one network. The first reference to *IPXQNET=00000002* limits the discovery to network 2. This is valuable information if there are several segments on the network.

The second reference to *IPXQNET*=107????? limits the discovery only to the servers that have internal IPX network numbers matching the pattern 107xxxxx. The discovery limit defined here would discover servers with internal network numbers such as 10705007, 10731001, and 1073500A, but not discover servers with an internal network number of 1275583F.

#### Sample NXPIP.INI File

The following sample *NXPIP.INI* file illustrates how to limit the discovery of IP networks and machines. In the sample *NXPIP.INI* file there are entries that reference specific machines (.003) and entries with wild cards (???). These wild card entries allow the discovery of other IP network segments.

## **Tuning the LANalyzer Agent for Optimum Network Monitoring Efficiency**

ManageWise, by default, installs the LANalyzer Agent on every ManageWise server; however, not every server needs to monitor network traffic. This default requires you to deactivate the LANalyzer Agent monitoring for all servers you do not want monitoring a network segment. To deactivate the LANalyzer Agent, change the line located in the *AUTOEXEC.NCF* that executes the *LANZ.NCF* to the following:

REM LANZ.NCF

To fully diagnose network problems, ManageWise requires only one server per network segment to load the LANalyzer Agent for monitoring network traffic.

#### Sample LANZ.NCF File

The following sample *LANZ.NCF* file illustrates how to configure the NetWare LANalyzer Agent to allocate additional resources. By modifying the *LANZ.NCF* file, you can:

- Capture a larger set of packets for network traffic diagnostics.
- Connect to the LANAlyzer agent with multiple consoles.

The following sample illustrates a LANZ.NCF file:

To modify *LANZ.NCF* file, follow these steps:

1. Open the *LANZ.NCF* file, then add the parameter, bound=10000, to the LOAD LANZMEM.NLM line so that it looks similar to the following:

LOAD LANZMEM.NLM bound=10000

**NOTE:** This parameter allows the agent to dynamically allocate more memory.

2. Add the parameter, TOPN=10, to the LOAD LANZSM.NLM line so that it looks similar to the following:

LOAD LANZSM.NLM topn=10

**NOTE:** This parameter allocates additional resources to handle the load required when multiple consoles connect to the agents.

- 3. Save and exit the *LANZ.NCF* file.
- Unload all of the LANalyzer agents by typing in the following command at the file server console:

ULANZ

5. Reload all of the LANalyzer agents by typing in the following command at the file server console:

LANZ

### **Configuring LANDesk Virus Protect**

LANDesk Virus Protect is an NetWare Loadable Module that prevents viruses from being introduced onto NetWare servers, personal computers, or any other devices on your network. You can configure this application to scan (continuously or on-demand) all of the file servers and personal computers on your network. When and how often LANDesk Virus Protect scans the server remains at your discretion. However, you can affect the performance of the server if you choose a scanning time during peak periods of network traffic.

You can configure Virus Protect to scan network volumes using the following parameters:

- Scan only the files being written to the server
- Scan only the files being read from the server
- Scan all files at all times

Obviously, the more often you scan files the greater the impact on server performance. If you choose to install Virus Protect, Compaq recommends a combination of the performance and protection parameters. You can achieve this balance by scanning only the files being written to the server. By choosing the combination of performance and protection, you accomplish several things:

- Prevent the server from scanning all network applications
- Ensure Virus Protect scans all new files introduced to the server

**NOTE**: To manually scan for viruses on your server, use the LANDesk Virus Protect option located on the NetWare Management Map Menu.

For more information on LANDesk Virus Protect, refer to the *ManageWise 1.0 LANDesk Manager Tools* document.

## The ManageWise Console

You can make several configuration modifications to enhance the performance of the management console. Some of these modifications require editing files while others are informational tips on using the console applications.

### **Memory Tuning**

To enhance memory resources, ensure that at least 512 kilobytes of memory is available on your system before launching Windows. By doing this, you allow the Windows resources to allocate the maximum amount of memory available for ManageWise and Compaq Insight Manager.

#### **6-8** Performance Recommendations

You need 75 percent of the Windows resources available so ManageWise and Insight Manager can open the maximum number of windows possible. The less memory you have on your system, the fewer number of windows can be opened. This constraint could hinder the effectiveness of ManageWise and Insight Manager on your network. For example, if you do not have enough available resources, you cannot open the number of windows that might be required to diagnose the problem.

To ensure that at least 512 kilobytes of memory is available on your system, follow these steps:

1. Add the NOEMS parameter to the *EMM386.EXE* command line within your *CONFIG.SYS* file. For example:

DEVICE=C:\DOS\EMM386.EXE NOEMS

**NOTE:** The NOEMS parameter provides access to extended memory but prevents access to expanded memory; therefore, makes more upper memory available for TSRs (Terminate and Stay Resident).

2. Load as many drivers and TSRs as possible into high memory.

**NOTE:** If you are running MS-DOS 6.22 or above, run *MEMMAKER.EXE*, found in the C:\DOS directory, to configure the loading of your drivers into upper memory optimally.

- 3. Remove any unnecessary drivers not needed for ManageWise such as your CD-ROM drivers.
- 4. Use the multiple boot configuration option in MS-DOS 6.22 to help load only the necessary drivers.

For more information on configuring MS-DOS memory and multibooting using MS-DOS 6.22, refer to the documentation provided with the MS-DOS Manuals, or refer to the sample *CONFIG.SYS* and *AUTOEXEC.BAT* files.

#### Sample CONFIG.SYS File

The following sample file illustrates how to edit the *CONFIG.SYS* file to configure the boot process and memory of your console optimally.

Multiple boot configurations allow you to load into memory only the drivers necessary to boot the console. For example, under the [DOS] configuration section the *CONFIG.SYS* file loads drivers to support a CD-ROM drive. Under the [MANAGEWISE] configuration section there is no support for a CD-ROM drive. By using this configuration, you can:

- Maximize the amount of memory available when running ManageWise.
- Access the CD-ROM.

The *CONFIG.SYS* file also contains several settings for memory and performance tuning. To maximize the amount of MS-DOS base memory before entering Windows, load all device drivers (or as many as possible) into high memory by using the DEVICEHIGH command. Your command lines should look similar to the following:

DEVICEHIGH=FS2\_ASPI.SYS/1
DEVICEHIGH=FS2\_CD.SYS /D:CDROM1

Finally, the *CONFIG.SYS* file also contains bracketed options such as [menu]. These options are *tokens* (or key words) to MS-DOS. Items that follow the [menu] option define the multiboot configuration selection menu. For example, the command line that is responsible for the ManageWise Configuration option is as follows:

menuitem=MANAGEWISE,ManageWise Configuration

**NOTE**: Each configuration option defined in the [menu] section has a corresponding section in the *CONFIG.SYS* and *AUTOEXEC.BAT* files.

#### Sample AUTOEXEC.BAT File

The *AUTOEXEC.BAT* file also contains several settings for memory and performance tuning just like the *CONFIG.SYS* file. To maximize the amount of MS-DOS base memory before entering Windows, load all TSRs (or as many as possible) into high memory by using the LOADHIGH command. Your command lines should look similar to the following:

LH DOSKEY /INSERT /KEY\_BUFFER=128
LH SHARE
LH brequest /r:26

**NOTE**: Load your network drivers into high memory as well.

Secondly, the *AUTOEXEC.BAT* file uses the MS-DOS *SMARTDRV.EXE* file. SMARTDrive is a disk-caching executable file that comes with MS-DOS. The SMARTDrive file loads two parameters that help boost performance. They are:

C+ 1024

The first parameter (C+) tells SMARTDrive to use delayed writes when writing to the C: drive. This helps boost the performance of disk-intensive applications, such as ManageWise. The second parameter (1024) tells SMARTDrive how much memory to use for disk-caching.



**CAUTION:** Using delayed writes might cause data corruption if a General Protection Fault error occurs or the system loses power. For more information on disk-caching, refer to the MS-DOS documentation.

**NOTE**: The number used in the second parameter depends on the amount of memory on your system. The more memory you have installed on your system, the more memory you can use for disk-caching.

#### **6-12** Performance Recommendations

Finally, the *AUTOEXEC.BAT* file also contains *tokens* (or key words) to MS-DOS. However, *tokens* in the *AUTOEXEC.BAT* file are preceded by a colon rather than being enclosed with brackets like in the *CONFIG.SYS* file. For example,

#### :MANAGEWISE

**NOTE**: Remember the items that follow a token consist of the multiboot configuration selection menu.

The following sample illustrates an AUTOEXEC.BAT file:

#### **Launching Compaq Insight Manager**

Another recommendation that could help enhance performance is to leave Compaq Insight Manager running after you launch it for the first time and minimize the program to an icon. This allows Insight Manager to receive traps. Also by leaving Insight Manager running in the background, you do not have to wait for the program to load into memory the next time you need to look at a server.

## **NetExplorer Manager**

The final recommendation is to run NetExplorer Manager only when necessary. If your network is reasonably static, there is no need to run NetExplorer Manager continually. Only execute the NetExplorer Manager when you initially launch ManageWise or when you make any changes to the network. By doing this, you can remove some of the input/output and processor load off your system.

However, if you decide not to run NetExplorer Manager continuously, consult the *ManageWise 1.0 NetWare Management System Software: Getting Started* document.

NOTE: The default configuration for NetExplorer Manager is to run continuously.

# Chapter 7

# **Server Management Solutions**

This chapter provides innovative server management solutions using Compaq Insight Manager with ManageWise. We have discussed in previous chapters how to integrate Insight Manager with ManageWise and the preinstallation considerations and recommendations involved with each product. This chapter presents scenarios you might encounter in your environment and our recommendations for solutions to these network management scenarios, which include:

- Determining why the network is running slow
- Planning for capacity needs
- Controlling servers on the network without using RCONSOLE
- Polling groups of devices on the network
- Managing clients

Compaq has integrated Insight Manager with ManageWise to provide your network with the most comprehensive hardware fault management available on the market. By using Compaq Insight Manager with ManageWise, users have the ability not only to prevent hardware problems, but also diagnose operating system issues. Compaq provides end-to-end, tested, and proven management solutions through the integration of Insight Manager and ManageWise.

Table 7-1 lists the most prevalent ManageWise icons used in the procedures located in this chapter. Table 7-1 provides the ManageWise icon and icon name. If you are unfamiliar with ManageWise, use this table to familiarize yourself with the icons; otherwise, proceed to the first solution "Determining Why the Network is Running Slow."

# **Determining Why the Network is Running Slow**

When the network is not performing optimally, your company is less productive and therefore potentially can lose money. The ability of Insight Manager to monitor Compaq hardware coupled with the ability of ManageWise to monitor the network infrastructure provides a proactive approach to determining network problems. The method used for diagnosing network problems with Insight Manager and ManageWise is as follows:

- Receive notification of a potential network problem
- Verify the problem on the network

- Determine cause of the problem
- Analyze the cause(s) of the problem

# **Using Insight Manager to Determine Network Problems**

The ability to monitor hardware at a low level allows you to pinpoint where and when you have a network problem. Insight Manager provides this information by giving you the ability to set user-defined thresholds on various Ethernet and Token Ring NIC statistics.

To manage your network proactively, you must determine which NIC statistic listed in Table 7-2 or 7-3 is best suited to monitor. However, to accomplish this task you must first determine:

- Your network configuration
- A baseline for your network traffic

Tables 7-2 and 7-3 provide a brief description of receive and transmit statistics that can occur within a NIC. Use these tables to determine which statistic type best describes potential problems you might have on your network, then follow the procedures immediately following the tables to set the appropriate threshold for that statistic type.

# Table 7-2 Ethernet Receive Statistics

Error Type	Description		
Total Packets	The number of unicast, non-unicast, discarded, error, and unknown protocol packets received for this interface. This value is for total packets received on the interface. Since you may have multiple interfaces on one NIC, this value might not represent the total number of packets received by the NIC.		

#### **Ethernet Receive Statistics** continued

Error Type	Description
Alignment Errors	The number of alignment errors that have occurred for this interface after the network interface supporting software was loaded. The alignment of a frame is checked by the receiver after the packet has failed the Cyclical Redundancy Check (CRC). Misaligned packets do not end on an 8-bit boundary. All packets contain a set number of bytes and must end after a defined number of bytes. Packets that do not end on a byte boundary fail the alignment check.
Frame Check Sequence (FCS) Errors	The number of FCS errors that have occurred for this interface after the network interface supporting software was loaded. The FCS field contains a 4-byte Cyclic Redundancy Check (CRC) value. The transmitting station calculates the CRC while sending the packet. The CRC value is placed in the FCS field. The receiving station calculates the CRC while receiving the packet, and matches the resulting value against the contents of the FCS field. If the numbers do not match, an FCS error has occurred.
	Track and resolve these errors. The two primary causes of FCS errors are cabling and component problems.
	If you receive FCS Errors, check to see whether you have Alignment errors or Late Collision errors. Cabling problems, such as shorts or noise caused by electromagnetic interference, are most likely to blame for CRC/Alignment errors. Improper cabling (not following cable specifications) is the most likely cause for late collisions. If a network is experiencing an increasing number of late collisions, or CRC/alignment errors, check for potential cabling problems.
Frame Too Long Errors	The number of times a receiving station found an oversized frame for this interface after the network interface supporting software was loaded. To avoid processing corrupt packets, the receiving station checks several packet characteristics, including the frame size. If a frame is larger than 1518 bytes (including the FCS field), it is considered oversized.

Error Type	Description		
MAC	This item increments each time an error occurs for this interface that		
Received	does not fall into any of the other error categories shown on the screen.		
Errors	For example, this item increments if a frame that is too short is detected.		
	If you see an excessive number of these errors, use a network analyzer to		
	check for short frame errors. The NIC might need to be replaced.

# Table 7-3 Ethernet Transmit Statistics

Error Type	Description
Total Packets	The number of unicast, non-unicast, discarded, error, and unknown protocol packets received for this interface. This value is for total packets received on the interface. Since you may have multiple interfaces on one NIC, this value might not represent the total number of packets received by the NIC.
Carrier Sense Errors	The number of frames transmitted with carrier sense errors for this interface after the network interface supporting software was loaded. The carrier sense signal is an ongoing activity of a data station to detect whether or not another station is transmitting. Carrier sense errors are detected when a station transmits a frame and does not detect its own signal on the wire.
Late Collisions	The number of late collisions that have occurred for this interface after the network interface supporting software was loaded. Late collisions might be a symptom of cabling problems. A late collision is one that occurred 64 bytes or more into the packet.

#### Ethernet Transmit Statistics continued

Error Type	Description
Excessive Collisions	The number of Excessive Collisions that have occurred for this interface after the network interface supporting software was loaded. A station might attempt to transmit up to 16 times before it must abort the attempt. Once the abort occurs, this counter increments.
	If you see an increase in deferred transmissions as well as excessive collisions, your network is extremely busy and this segment of the LAN is overcrowded. Reduce the traffic by reorganizing your LAN or adding a NIC to the server. For example, if you have 100 stations on one Ethernet bus, you may want to break it into two Ethernet buses by adding a NIC to your server. In this way you can balance the load by putting 50 stations on one bus and 50 on the other. If there are a few isolated stations creating the traffic, you may want to put them on a separate bus.
MAC Transmit Errors	This item increments each time an error occurs for this interface that does not fall into any of the other error categories shown on the screen. For example, this item increments if a frame that is too short is detected. If you see an excessive number of these errors, use a network analyzer to check for short frame errors. The NIC may need to be replaced.
Multiple Collisions Frames	This item shows the number of multiple collisions that have occurred for this interface after the network interface supporting software was loaded. Multiple collisions are frames involved in more than one collision before being successfully transmitted. These errors mean that the network is experiencing moderate to heavy traffic. If multiple collisions become more frequent, the count for excessive collisions escalates.
Single Collision Frames	This item shows the number of single collisions that have occurred for this interface after the network interface supporting software was loaded. Single collisions are frames that are involved in a single collision and then are transmitted successfully. These errors show that the network has light to moderate traffic. If single collisions become more frequent, the count for multiple collisions escalates.

#### **Ethernet Transmit Statistics** continued

Error Type	Description
Deferred Transmits	This item shows the number of frames that were deferred before transmission because the medium was busy. These are deferred transmissions for this interface after the network interface supporting software was loaded. Frames involved in collisions are not counted. Frames that wait before transmission are counted.  Deferred transmissions occur when the network is extremely busy, so busy that the NIC did not try to transmit. High counts of multiple collisions and excessive collisions also occur.

**NOTE**: For additional information on the causes and resolutions to these NIC statistics, refer to the Compaq Insight Manager Online Help.

To set the threshold for the statistic type found in Table 7-2 or 7-3, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch Insight Manager.
- 2. Select *View Server Data* from the Insight Manager Task List window. The title of this window reflects the selected server name.
- 3. Select the *NIC* push button from the Server View window.
- Select the appropriate NIC by slot number from the NIC Overview window.
- 5. Select the *View Interface* push button located at the bottom of the Slot *x* NIC window.

**NOTE:** The *x* within the NIC window represents the slot number for that NIC.

- 6. Select the *Advanced* push button from the Statistics window.
- 7. Select the statistic for which you want to set a threshold. For example, select *Transmit Error: Carrier Sense*.

You can find all of the NIC statistics in the Ethernet Statistics window.

- 8. Click the right mouse button to bring up the Options menu for the Transmit Error: Carrier Sense statistic.
- 9. Click the left mouse button to select *Set Threshold*.
- 10. Select the *New* push button from the Thresholds window.
- 11. Enter the new threshold parameters for options such as:

Value or Delta Top and Bottom Thresholds

12. Select the *Set* push button from the Set Thresholds window.

You have now set the threshold so that when this threshold is exceeded the Insight Management Agents send an alert to the console.

## Using ManageWise to Determine Network Problems

ManageWise has the ability to monitor the traffic on a particular segment of the network by using the LANalyzer Agent. This allows you to determine which node is causing traffic on a particular segment as well as the contents of that traffic.

For information on installing and configuring the NetWare LANalyzer Agent, refer to the *ManageWise 1.0 NetWare Management System Software: Analyzing Your Network* document.

To use ManageWise to diagnosis network problems, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the *View* option on the ManageWise menu bar.
- 2. Select *All* from the View drop down menu.
- 3. Select Network Segments off the View menu.

This action displays all of the network segments that are currently being monitored.

- 4. Highlight the segment that you want to monitor.
- 5. Select the *Performance Statistics for a Selected Segment* icon (shown in Table 7-1) from the network segments window.

This displays the network dashboard along with the top 20 busiest stations on the network.

Next, you must determine which server (or stations) is generating the most traffic. If one of the stations displayed on the dashboard is generating 50 percent or more of network traffic, you need to analyze this server. To do this, you need to either view the conversations the stations are having with the server or capture the packets associated with that server to determine the contents of the traffic.

#### **Viewing Performance Statistics**

Viewing the performance statistics and conversations that are occurring with a particular server, you can determine who is generating the traffic: the server or the user(s) of the server. To view these performance statistics, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the *Performance Statistics for Stations* icon (shown in Table 7-1) from the Network Segments window.
  - This action brings up the Top 20 Stations Statistics window.
- 2. Select the server that contains the station conversations you want to view.

You are now viewing the performance statistics for stations connected to the selected server. To further diagnose network traffic, proceed to the "Capturing Packets" section.

#### **Capturing Packets**

Packet capture allows you to view the data that is being transmitted, thus allowing you to further diagnose the root cause of the traffic. To capture packets, follow these steps:

1. Select the *Create a New Packet Capture Buffer* icon (shown in Table 7-1) from the Network Segments window.

This action brings up the Packet Capture Setup window.

2. Configure the packets you want to capture.

By viewing the actual data being generated (for the entire segment or between two nodes on the segment), you can determine which application is generating the traffic.

**NOTE**: For more information on configuring the packet capture, refer to the *ManageWise 1.0 NetWare Management System Software: Analyzing Your Network* document.

Now that you have configured each server on your network to alert you when a problem occurs, you can easily analyze, tune, correct and protect your network from excessive traffic.

# **Planning for Capacity Needs**

Not knowing what the expansion possibilities and running out of resources on your server make managing your network difficult. However, Insight Manager and ManageWise can help minimize downtime in order to perform the necessary server upgrades.

After being alerted that the server resources are running low, Insight Manager can view the expansion and upgrade options inside the server. With this upgrade information, you can order the necessary components and schedule server downtime to perform the upgrade. Insight Manager can also determine how quickly this resource is being used up by using the Automatic Data Collection (ADC) feature to trend the server resource utilization.

#### **Determining When Resources are Low**

If your NetWare server runs out of cache moveable memory or cache buffers, your server resources are low. When this condition takes place the Compaq Insight Management Agents for NetWare automatically alert the ManageWise console, then you can take corrective action.

You can apply this same methodology to monitoring disk space utilization. You can set a threshold on the drive volume space utilization by using Insight Manager.

To set a threshold for drive space utilization, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch Insight Manager.
- 2. Select *View Server Data* from the Insight Manager Task List window. The title of this window will reflect the selected server name.
- 3. Select the *Mass Storage* push button from the Server View window.
- 4. Select the volume for which you would like to set a threshold.

For example, select the SYS volume. All of the file system volumes are located on the Mass Storage Overview window.

- 5. Click the right mouse button to display the Options menu for drive space utilization.
- 6. Click the left mouse button to select *Set Threshold*.
- 7. Select the *New* push button from the Thresholds window.
- 8. Enter the new threshold parameters for options such as:

Value or Delta
Top and Bottom Thresholds

A good example for entering new threshold parameters would be to set the Value threshold to 75. By doing this, you receive an alert when more than 75 percent of the total available space on the file system is utilized.

9. Select the *Set* push button from the Set Thresholds window.

You have now set the threshold for drive space utilization on the network.

#### **Determining the Hardware Upgrade Options**

Now that you have set your server thresholds, you are ready to take corrective action when you receive an alert. When an alert occurs, launch Insight Manager to view the current hardware configuration. By viewing your hardware configuration, you can determine the upgrade options available such as a hard drive or memory upgrade.

#### **Determining Hard Drive Upgrade Options**

To determine the hard drive configuration upgrade options, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch Insight Manager.
- 2. Select *View Server Data* from Insight Manager Task List window. The title of this window reflects the selected server name.
- 3. Select the *Mass Storage* push button from the Server View window.
- 4. Select the drive controller associated with the alert generated, such as the system board SCSI controller.

**NOTE:** The view of the drive subsystem might vary depending on your server and the controller configuration of your system.

5. View any drive slots and SCSI IDs available on the selected controller.

Viewing the hard drive configuration information allows you to determine your upgrade options. Another key resource you might want to view is the server memory. To do this, proceed to the "Determining Memory Upgrade Options" section.

#### **Determining Memory Upgrade Options**

To view the memory configuration of your server, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch Insight Manager.
- 2. Select *View Server Data* from the Insight Manager Task List window. The title of this window reflects the selected server name.
- 3. Select the *Configuration* push button from the Server View window.
- 4. Scroll down the list box window until you reach the section *Memory Board Identified*.

This displays each memory board that is in the system including the system board, each SIMM socket, and the size of the SIMM in each socket. If there is no SIMM in the socket, Insight Manager displays the SIMM as *Not Installed*.

Now that you have determined what physical resources are available on each server, you can trend the server utilization to determine how quickly the resources are being used.

## **Trending Resource Utilization**

Insight Manager allows you to determine how quickly the volume space utilization is increasing by using the ADC feature. This Insight Manager feature can gather the volume space utilization data, then provide you with a graph so you can view the latest trend for your network.

#### **Gathering the Data**

To use Automatic Data Collection, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch Insight Manager.
- 2. Select *Server Setup* from the Insight Manager Task List window. The title of this window reflects the selected server name.
- 3. Select *Automatic Data Collection* in the upper left hand corner of the Server Setup window.

#### 4. Select *OK*.

IMPORTANT: You must allow the ADC feature time to gather the necessary data in order to trend the volume space utilization information. In addition, you can perform ADC on a maximum of ten servers simultaneously.

Once you have gathered data, you can view the trend of this information by following the procedures in the "Viewing the Trend" section.

#### Viewing the Trend

To view the trend of the volume space utilization data, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch Insight Manager.
- 2. Select *View Server Data* from the Insight Manager Task List window. The title of this window reflects the selected server name.
- 3. Select the *Mass Storage* push button from the Server View window.
- 4. Select the volume for which you would like to display a graph.
  - For example, select the SYS volume. All of the file system volumes are located on the Mass Storage Overview window.
- 5. Click the right mouse button to display the Options menu for the volume space utilization data.
- 6. Click the left mouse button to select *Graph*.

This action displays a graph allowing you to analyze volume space utilization.

**NOTE**: For more information on ADC and Graphing, refer to the *Compaq Insight Manager User Guide* documentation.

You now have the ability to determine the availability of physical resources and resource utilization. With this information you can decide when a resource is running low and rectify the problem before it occurs.

# Controlling Servers on the Network Without Using RCONSOLE

Insight Manager can establish a TCP/IP-based Telnet connection to any machine on the network that supports Telnet connections and has Compaq Insight Management Agents installed. This TCP/IP based Telnet connection allows you to run a command line prompt session on any server on your network; therefore, allowing you to perform some configuration and diagnostics on the remote machine.

**NOTE**: If you have Insight Manager installed with the server list and you have TCP/IP loaded on the workstation, you can remotely control and manage Microsoft Windows NT or any other operating system supported by Compaq that has an active Telnet Daemon.

You can also remotely control a Compaq server without running the network operating system. This enables you to control the server while it is running the Compaq System Configuration program or Compaq Diagnostics. For more information about using the Insight Manager Remote Control feature, refer to the *Compaq Insight Manager User Guide* document.

To control a server remotely using Insight Manager, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch Insight Manager to the desired server.
- 2. Select Remote Control from the task list window.

This action displays a Telnet window.

**NOTE:** If the desired server has both IPX/SPX and TCP/IP, configure the Server Setup to utilize TCP/IP rather than IPX. If the server is configured with IPX, Insight Manager tries to establish an NVT connection to the selected server. For information on configuring the communications protocol for remotely connecting with a selected server, refer to the *Compaq Insight Manager User Guide* document.

3. Login to the server and activate a Telnet session, then perform the tasks to diagnose or configure the machine.

Without using RCONSOLE to control network servers, Insight Manager allows you to perform the necessary functions to manage network servers properly.

# Polling Groups of Devices on the Network

To ensure connectivity, you can selectively group devices on the network and then poll all of these devices. This is extremely effective if you want to monitor a select group of routers to regional offices. Monitoring specific routers and servers eliminates excessive alert messages such as *server inaccessible* due to a router to the region went down instead of the server(s).

To create a group and set up polling intervals for that group, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch ManageWise.
- 2. Select Fault from the ManageWise menu bar.
- 3. Select  $Test\ Connectivity$ , then Periodically from the drop down menu.

This activates the *Add Target* window.

- 4. Enter the name, IPX address, or IP address of the machine you want to monitor.
- 5. Enter the interim time for polling the devices. This is know as the polling interval. The default is 5 seconds.
- 6. Enter the *Number of Retries*.
  - This figure determines how many times the connectivity test can fail before it notifies you that the node is unreachable.
- 7. Select *Add* to add this new node to the group you are creating.
- 8. Repeat steps 4 through 7 until all the nodes in the group are added.
- 9. Click on Exit.

- 10. Click on the *Save* icon (shown in Table 7-1) located on the *Connectivity Test* title bar. This displays the *Save Profile* window.
- 11. Enter a descriptive file name for this group of devices. For example, *NAROUT1.PRF* (North American Regional Routers 1).
- 12. Select OK.
- 13. Click on the *Start the Connectivity Test* Icon (shown in Table 7-1) on the *Connectivity Test* window title bar.

The Connectivity Test runs continuously until you turn it off by closing the *Connectivity Test* window.

This completes creating a group and set up polling intervals for that group.

**NOTE**: For more information on the Connectivity Test, refer to the *ManageWise 1.0 NetWare Management System Software: Getting Started* document.

# **Managing Clients**

Managing clients on a network is an important task for today's network administrator. ManageWise provides the ability to inventory, control, and diagnose clients on your network; therefore, allowing you to resolve user problems and manage your network more effectively.

**NOTE**: Compaq Insight Manager has the ability to provide pre-failure alerting for hard drive failures, thermal warnings, and asset information for Compaq Desktop clients that support Intelligent Manageability using Insight Desktop Agents for Windows 95 or Windows NT.

## **Client Inventory**

To access the ManageWise Client Inventory Control features, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch ManageWise.
- 2. Select the desired client from the Network Management Map.

- 3. Select *Tools* from the ManageWise menu bar.
- 4. Select *Intel LANDesk Tools*, then *Inventory Manager* from the Tools drop down menu. This launches the Inventory Manager program which displays the current inventory information for the selected node.

Additionally, Inventory Manager allows you to view client asset information for all nodes connected to the server.

You have now viewed inventory information for the selected machine or node on the network.

**NOTE**: Intel provides an upgrade for the LANDesk 1.51 portions of ManageWise to LANDesk Management Suite 2.0 which supports Compaq Desktop Intelligent Manageability features.

#### **Client Remote Control**

To access the ManageWise Client Remote Control features, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch ManageWise.
- 2. Select the desired client from the Network Management Map.
- 3. Select *Tools* from the ManageWise menu bar.
- 4. Select *Intel LANDesk Tools*, then *Desktop Access* from the Tools drop down menu. This launches the Desktop Access program.

**NOTE:** All of the LANDesk Tools are available from the ManageWise Tools Menu.

5. Select the *Control Workstation* icon (shown in Table 7-1) from the Desktop Access tool bar.

You are now remotely controlling a selected node on the network.

#### **Client Diagnostics**

To access the ManageWise Client Diagnostics features, follow these steps:

- 1. Launch ManageWise.
- 2. Select the desired client from the Network Management Map.
- 3. Select *Tools* from the ManageWise menu bar.
- 4. Select *Intel LANDesk Tools*, then *Desktop Access* from the Tools drop down menu. This launches the Desktop Access program.

**NOTE:** All of the LANDesk Tools are available from the ManageWise Tools Menu.

- 5. Select any of the diagnostics tools built into the Desktop Access application from the Desktop Access tool bar such as:
  - Viewing Workstation Information
  - □ Displaying CMOS Information
  - Displaying Network Diagnostic Information

**NOTE**: For more information on managing clients with ManageWise, refer to the *ManageWise 1.0 LANDesk Manager Tools* document.

Inventory management, client diagnostics, and remote control of the client workstations are key components when managing any LAN. These features help you keep the machine running and maintain current records on your network resources.

Accomplishing crucial network management tasks within your business-critical environment is possible when you use Insight Manager with ManageWise. Equipped with these tools you can proactively diagnose network traffic in great detail, plan for future network server resource needs, remotely control servers on the network, periodically determine the connectivity to key nodes on the network, and manage clients. The ability to perform all of these critical tasks from the same platform greatly enhances your ability to easily manage your network and lowers the downtime and cost of ownership.

# Appendix A Using the Compaq MIB Information

This appendix provides you with information that will help you use Insight MIBs in your SNMP environment. It includes an overview of the Insight MIBs organization and identifies and describes categories of information contained within the MIBs. This appendix also discusses common types of information that you might want to know about the servers in your network.

# Organization of Compaq Insight MIBs

As stated in Chapter 3 of this TechNote, "Compaq Management Technologies," Compaq fully supports the SNMP standard. The assigned enterprise ID for Compaq is 232. Therefore, all MIB variables maintained by Compaq begin with the ASN.1 syntax 1.3.6.1.4.1.232.

Compaq has defined several MIBs in the Compaq enterprise. The MIBs are classified, where appropriate, according to the subsystem of a Compaq server.

# **Key MIB Information**

The Insight MIBs contain many attributes that provide you with a comprehensive picture of the configuration, operating statistics, and general status aspects of the operation of your Compaq servers. However, since there are several hundred MIB attributes, the following discussion focuses on several categories which contain key items on major subsystems within your servers. Once you identify a potential problem area, you can retrieve additional information to assist you with a specific problem resolution.

To simplify the key MIB information, it has been grouped into the following general categories:

- Configuration
- Operating Statistics
- Condition Attributes

The following sections describe each general category and provide detailed subsets within each main category. Detailed information about each attribute is found in the referenced MIB file for each attribute. The MIB files are on the Compaq Insight Management MIBs diskette.

With this information you to construct queries that will provide specific details in monitoring your systems. Compaq has included files on the Compaq Insight Management MIBs diskette for HP OpenView and IBM NetView for AIX, which implement queries based upon these items. See the Compaq TechNote, *Integrating Compaq Insight Manager with Enterprise Management Platforms*, for more detailed information.

## Configuration

The MIB attributes in the following configuration categories describe information that is determined at system configuration or operating system load time. The attributes typically do not change as a result of ongoing operation of the hardware or software. MIB attributes in these categories provide you with information about the static configuration of the hardware and software of your system.

#### **General System Description**

The attributes in this category describe several items which come from the standard SNMP MIB-II (RFC1213) that are of interest in generally identifying the system. Consult the referenced MIB file, which is included with your management console software, for more information on these attributes.

# **Using the MIB Information**

The primary usage of the condition attribute is to provide a high-level status of major subsystems within your system. You can monitor these items on a periodic basis. Any change in status indicates that you should investigate the subsystem further. The following sections provide some examples of the types of activities that can be supported by using the MIB information.

#### **Environment**

The environment condition attributes provide information on the environmental conditions in and around your system. If one of the attributes become set to "Degraded" or "Failed," you should examine the conditions surrounding your system for a lack of cool air flow or a possible failure of a cooling fan.

#### **System Performance**

You can use the attributes in the Hard Drive Read/Write/Seek and Network Interface Controller categories to monitor general system usage. Since many of these attributes are counts, you might want to monitor them on a periodic basis and convert them to rates to better use this information. If you notice continuous high rates, it might be an indication of a potential system overload.

#### **Resource Usage**

The usage of system resources can be seen by monitoring the Operating System Resource Utilization and Hardware Utilization categories. If you notice that the operating system file system usage is approaching your acceptable minimum for available space, you might want to plan to archive some files, examine the file systems for unused files that might be candidates for deletion, or consider adding more physical disk drives to increase disk space.

# Appendix B Trap Overview

Insight Agents generate traps to notify you of events that require action. Some traps enable you to be proactive by warning you of status changes or degraded states. Others require immediate attention.

Depending on the version of Insight Agents loaded on a particular server, you could receive a version 1.x type trap or a version 2.x type trap.

The version 1.x traps defined in the MIBs have a different base identifier, called the *enterprise ID*, for each MIB file (Intelligent Drive Array, SCSI Devices, and so on). The MIB enterprise IDs are the "Object ID" items in the descriptions of the MIBs shown in Table 4-1. For example, the version 1.x trap for Intelligent Drive Array is 1.3.6.1.4.1.232.3. The version 2.x traps have the same enterprise ID (1.3.6.1.4.1.232) for all traps defined in all of the MIBs.

The enterprise ID combined with the specific trap ID uniquely identify the trap.

**NOTE:** Insight Agents for NetWare prior to version 2.60 may generate both version 1 and version 2 trap formats. Beginning with version 2.60, all Insight Agents generate version 2 trap formats.

Each trap message lists the trap name, the identification number, the description, and the values for the trap variables. The trap variables appear in alphabetical order with a descriptive title indicating an important event has occurred. Immediately following the title is the numerical equivalence for the trap variable listed. By providing you with this message, you can quickly and easily translate the trap variables you receive from your management platform to determine if the trap requires immediate attention.

# **B-2** Trap Overview

Beginning with version 2.60, two additional variables are included in all Insight Agent traps: The first variable is the originating system's hostname and the second variable identifies the system as either a server or client. The remaining variables are identical to those generated by previous versions. To maintain compatibility with older agents, the updated traps were added as "new" traps in the Compaq MIB. For example, Trap 3008, an IDA Logical Drive Status Change trap, supersedes Trap 3001. Version 2.6 and later agents will generate a 3008 trap for this event instead of a 3001 trap.

The Compaq traps described in the following tables are grouped by subject as well as Trap IDs. The Trap ID listed in parentheses is the identifier for the superseded (pre-2.60) trap.

# Table B-1 Drive Array Traps

Trap Name: cpqDa3LogDrvStatusChange

**Trap ID**: 3008 (3001)

Description:

A logical drive status change has occurred. The current status is indicated by the included status variable.

"Bad Connection" status (9) - The physical drive in a Compaq Drive Array is not responding to commands from the array controller. Several causes are possible:

- A drive was removed from the system.
- The data cable connecting the drive to the array has failed.

**IMPORTANT**: Do not attempt to re-seat any cables while the server is on. Damage to the drives or array controller will result.

- The cable connecting the drive to the array has become loose at either end and must be reseated.
- The cable connecting an external storage subsystem to the server has become loose.
- The power to the drive has been interrupted. This can be caused by a loosened drive power supply cable or a failed power supply in the server or disk subsystem.

#### **Drive Array Traps** Continued

"Failed" status (3) - One or more physical drives have failed. Data is no longer protected on the drive array.

"OK" status (2) - This alarm is typically issued upon completion of repairs to a Compaq Drive Array logical drive. This alarm occurs whenever the logical drive status has returned to a normal state from any other state. In fault tolerant configurations, it is issued following the resolution of the Drive Array Logical Drive Status Change - Rebuilding alarm. In non-fault tolerant configurations, it is issued following the Drive Array Logical Drive Status Change - Failed alarm, after the failed drive has been replaced.

"Overheating" status (10) - The temperature inside an external drive array enclosure has risen above factory preset levels. If the temperature continues to rise, damage to the drives within the enclosure may result. Elevated temperatures may cause erratic operation of a physical drive within the array, causing data loss. This alarm may be caused by the removal of the enclosure cover, which impairs the cooling system performance significantly, or by a cooling fan failure in the drive array enclosure.

**NOTE:** Do not operate Compaq server and storage products with the chassis covers removed. Airflow inside the unit is interrupted, and proper cooling is not possible. Removing the chassis covers also violates the FCC certification and UL listing.

"Ready for Rebuild" status (6)-A failed drive has been replaced, and the system is ready to begin Automatic Data Recovery on the logical drive. This alarm is issued after a failed drive has been replaced or if a drive that previously failed appears to work again after the power is turned on.

**NOTE:** The system is ready to begin Automatic Data Recovery. Perform an orderly shutdown of the operating system and server, and turn the server off. Turn it on again to begin Automatic Data Recovery.

"Rebuilding" status (7) - Automatic Data Recovery is underway.

"Recovering" status (5) - A physical drive failed within the Compaq Drive Array. The drive array is in a recovery mode. No data has been lost, due to the fault tolerant mode currently in use.

**NOTE**: At the first available opportunity, replace the failed drive.

"Shutdown" status (11) - The external drive array has stopped operating because of elevated temperatures. Do not attempt to operate the disk storage subsystem while temperatures are elevated. Severe damage to the disk drives will occur. Elevated temperatures will cause erratic operation of a physical drive within the array, causing data loss. The elevated temperatures can cause physical changes to a hard drive, leading to data corruption. This alarm may be caused by the removal of the enclosure cover, which impairs the cooling system performance significantly, or by a cooling fan failure in the drive array enclosure.

**IMPORTANT:** If a logical drive shuts down due to high temperatures, data may no longer be available from the server or storage subsystem containing the logical drive. In this case, you may need to physically examine the server or storage subsystem to understand the cause of the alarm. Do not operate Compaq server and storage products with the chassis covers removed. Airflow inside the unit will be interrupted, and proper cooling is not possible. Removing the chassis covers also violates the FCC certification and UL listing.

**"Wrong Drive" status (8)** - During remedial hardware maintenance, the incorrect physical drive was replaced in an array.

IMPORTANT: Do not return the removed drive or the drive indicated as "wrong" for repair. Perform an orderly shutdown of the system, and run Compaq Drive Array Advanced Diagnostics if you need further assistance in identifying failed drives and/or drives installed in the wrong location. You must bring the system down, turn it off, and return the removed drive to its original location. Turn the system back on. After you reinstall the removed drive, identify the correct failed drive.

"Inactive" status (4) - This alarm signifies that the spare is in a ready state. This alarm is typically issued if you install or replace a spare drive in a Compaq Drive Array. It is issued after you replace a failed spare drive with a new one. This alarm may also occur when a drive fails and the spare becomes active, the failed drive is replaced, and the spare eventually becomes inactive again. In fault tolerant configurations, when a drive fails and a spare drive is available, the storage subsystem begins building data onto that spare. If the failed drive is replaced before restoration has completed, the process halts and the data is restored to the replacement drive instead. If the failed drive is replaced after the build process is complete, the system reconstructs the data to the replacement drive, and the spare will reverts to its original inactive state. This keeps a spare drive available. If you have installed or replaced a failed drive in the drive array, this alarm is to be expected.

Trap Name: cpqDa3SpareStatusChange

Trap ID: 3009 (3002)

**Description:** A spare drive status change has occurred. The current status is indicated by the included status variable.

"Active" status (6) - A physical drive failed. The array successfully restored data onto a spare. That spare drive has now become active and replaces the failed drive. In fault tolerant configurations, when a spare drive is available, the storage subsystem begins building data onto that spare. If the failed drive is replaced before restoration has completed, the process halts, and the data is restored to the replacement drive instead. If the failed drive is replaced after the build process is complete, the system reconstructs the data to the replacement drive, and the spare reverts to its original inactive state. This keeps a spare drive available.

"Building" status (5) - This alarm is issued when a spare drive is brought online to replace a failed drive and the drive array subsystem begins to build data onto the spare. In fault tolerant configurations, when a spare drive is available, the storage subsystem begins building data onto that spare. If the failed drive is replaced before restoration has completed, the process halts, and the data is restored to the replacement drive instead. If the failed drive is replaced after the build process is complete, the system reconstructs the data to the replacement drive, and the spare reverts to its original inactive state. This keeps a spare drive available. When a spare drive is available, this alarm is usually issued after the Drive Array Physical Drive Status Change - Failed alarm. This alarm indicates that a drive has failed. When the building is complete, the Drive Array Spare Drive Status Change - Active alarm is issued, indicating that the drive array is utilizing the spare drive in the array in place of a failed drive. Replace the failed physical drive as soon as possible. WARNING: Do not interrupt the drive building process.

**"Failed" status (3)** - This alarm indicates that a spare drive in a drive array failed. Replace the spare as soon as possible. Until you replace it, no spare is available in case of array failure.

"Inactive" status (4) - This alarm signifies that the spare is in a ready state. This alarm is typically issued if you install or replace a spare drive in a Compaq Drive Array. It is issued after you replace a failed spare drive with a new one. This alarm may also occur when a drive fails and the spare becomes active, the failed drive is replaced, and the spare eventually becomes inactive again. In fault tolerant configurations, when a drive fails and a spare drive is available, the storage subsystem begins building data onto that spare. If the failed drive is replaced before restoration has completed, the process halts and the data is restored to the replacement drive instead. If the failed drive is replaced after the build process is complete, the system reconstructs the data to the replacement drive, and the spare reverts to its original inactive state. This keeps a spare drive available. If you installed or replaced a failed drive in the drive array, this alarm is to be expected.

**Trap Name:** cpqDa3PhyDrvStatusChange

**Trap ID**: 3010 (3003)

**Description:** 

A physical drive status change has occurred. The current status is indicated by the included status variable.

"Failed" status (3) - A physical drive has failed in a mass storage subsystem. In configurations that are not fault tolerant, this alarm is critical. The mass storage subsystem failed, and server operation stopped. You must replace the failed drive before system operation can begin again. In a fault tolerant configuration, the overall system condition is degraded, but still operational. You may receive additional alarms, such as Drive Array Logical Drive Status Change - Recovering, or Drive Array Spare Drive Status Change - Active.

"OK" status (2) - This alarm indicates an improving condition and is issued after a physical drive fault has been corrected or when you add a new hot pluggable physical drive.

**Trap Name:** cpqDa3PhyDrvThreshPassedTrap

**Trap ID**: 3011 (3004)

**Description:** 

The server issuing this alarm has a drive that exceeded one or more factory preset thresholds for functional degradation. Many Compaq high performance drive array hard drives are "stamped" by the drive manufacturer with minimum functional characteristics. As a result of normal wear and tear, the operation of a hard drive may gradually deteriorate. If certain thresholds are exceeded, the drive may not perform to specified levels, and may be subject to hardware failure sometime in the future. Drives that exceed these thresholds are considered "failed," although true catastrophic failure has not yet occurred. Compaq will replace drives that have exceeded these thresholds if these drives are still under warranty.

Trap Name: cpgDa3AccelStatusChange

**Trap ID**: 3012 (3005)

Description:

This trap indicates a status change event concerning the drive array accelerator. The current status is indicated by the included status variable.

- "Enabled" status (3) This alarm typically occurs when a Compaq Array Accelerator battery set has fully recharged from a discharged condition. The array accelerator is ready to accept posted writes.
- "Permanently Disabled" status (5) The write cache operations of the Array Accelerator are permanently disabled. Consult the cpqDaAccelErrCode MIB item for further information about why this trap occurred. You can perform an orderly shutdown, and run Compaq Drive Array Advanced Diagnostics if you need further information.
- "Temporarily Disabled" status (4) The Array Accelerator on the drive array controller has been temporarily disabled, due to one of the following reasons:
- The accelerator is holding data, and is configured for a different Drive Array Controller.
   Make sure the accelerator is installed on the original controller.
- Battery charge level is below 75 percent.
- Sufficient resources to perform posted writes are not available. This may be due to a current rebuilding process.
- The accelerator has failed or has been detached from the IDA-2 Controller.
- The host operating system has temporarily disabled posted writes.

Consult the cpqDaAccelErrCode MIB item for further information about why this trap occurred.

**Trap Name:** cpqDa3AccelBadDataTrap

Trap ID: 3013 (3006)

#### **Description:**

This trap indicates an event concerning the contents of the drive array accelerator. The current accelerator data status is indicated by the included status variable.

"None" status (2) - A power loss to the server occurred. The battery-backed Array Accelerator functioned properly and saved all data stored in the cache. When the system is restarted, the stored data will be written to disk.

"Possible" status (3) - When the system was powered up, the battery set was not sufficiently charged. When the batteries are not sufficiently charged, and the system resumes power, the board does not retain stored data. If no data was stored, no data was lost.

Several causes of this alarm are possible:

- If the system was without power for eight days, and the battery packs were on (battery sets activate only if the system loses power unexpectedly), any data stored in the cache was lost.
- The battery set may have a problem. Check the Battery Status for more information.
- The Array Accelerator board has been replaced with a new board that has discharged batteries. No data is lost, and the Array Accelerator will automatically be enabled when the batteries reach full charge.

Trap Name: cpqDa2AccelBatteryFailed

Trap ID: 3014 (3007)

#### **Description:**

This trap signifies that the Insight Agent has detected a battery status change associated with the array accelerator. The current battery status is indicated by the included status variable.

"Charging" status (3) - The battery set power is below 75% of nominal and is being charged.

"Degraded" Status (5) - The battery set in the Array Accelerator is operating, but one of the batteries has failed to recharge correctly. This condition jeopardizes the integrity of the battery-backed cache. Replace the Array Accelerator as soon as possible. If allowed to continue, the battery set might fail, and the drive array controller will no longer write data to the Array Accelerator. Server performance may be affected during this time. After the Array Accelerator is replaced, the Drive Array Accelerator Battery Status - Recharging alarm is issued. Once recharged, the alarm Drive Array Accelerator Battery Status - OK is issued, indicating that the array accelerator subsystem is operational.

"Failed" Status (4) - The Array Accelerator can no longer protect data in the cache in the event of a power interruption to the server. Replace the Array Accelerator as soon as possible. The replaced Array Accelerator batteries must reach full charge before the controller will allow data to be written to the Array Accelerator subsystem. Server performance may be affected during this time.

"OK" status (2) - The battery set has reached a fully charged condition.

# Table B-2 SCSI Traps

**Trap Name:** cpqScsi3CntlrStatusChange

**Trap ID**: 5005 (5001)

Description:

A SCSI controller status change has occurred. The current status is indicated by the included status variable.

"Failed" status (3) - A SCSI Controller failed. This alarm may be issued with physical drive alarms if the controller cannot communicate with the system.

"OK" status (2) - A SCSI Controller has been replaced. This alarm indicates an improving condition.

**Trap Name:** cpqScsi3PhyDrvStatusChange

**Trap ID**: 5006 (5003)

#### Description:

A status change has occurred to a physical drive attached to the SCSI controller. The current status is indicated by the included status variable.

"Failed" status (3) - A physical drive failed in a SCSI mass storage subsystem. Replace the drive.

"OK" status (2) - This alarm indicates an improving condition. When a physical drive error is corrected, this alarm is issued.

"Removed while Failed" status (7) - A SCSI drive installed in the mass storage subsystem has been removed. The removed drive has failed and must be replaced to restore the system to its original configuration. This alarm may be issued if the removed drive was not replaced prior to the time the status was polled by the software.

"Removed while OK" status (6) - A SCSI drive installed in the mass storage subsystem has been removed while operating properly. If the drive was inadvertently removed, return it to its original position.

**Trap Name:** cpqTapePhyDrvStatusChange

**Trap ID**: 5007 (5004)

# Description:

A status change has occurred to a tape drive attached to the SCSI controller. The current status is indicated by the included status variable.

"Degraded" status (3) - This alarm indicates that a reread or rewrite threshold has been exceeded; backup integrity might have been compromised. Follow steps listed under "Failed" status.

"Failed" status (4) - A SCSI tape drive failed. For additional details, check the error status of the backup application. Follow these steps:

- 1. Clean the tape drive head and try the backup again (refer to your tape hardware user manual for more details on this procedure).
- 2. If step #1 fails, replace the tape media with new tape media and try the backup again.
- 3. If step #2 fails, cycle the power on the tape drive and try the backup again.
- 4. If the above steps fail, replace the drive.

"OK" status (2) - A SCSI tape drive has been replaced. This alarm indicates that the tape drive is now ready for operation.

**Trap Name:** cpqHe3CorrectableMemoryError

**Trap ID**: 6015 (6001)

Description:

This alarm indicates that a block of memory has failed or is failing and must be replaced soon. This condition is not generally critical since the memory controller is able to correct the problem; however, an error of this type indicates that a memory component is failing or has failed in the server issuing the alarm. The system continues to correct any errors it can. Correct the problem as soon as possible. Further degradation of the memory components may occur, and then errors may no longer be correctable.

Trap Name: cpqHe3CorrectableMemoryLogDisabled

**Trap ID**: 6016 (6002)

**Description:** 

Correctable memory error tracking has been disabled due to excessive alerts. Logging of correctable memory errors ceases when the error count exceeds a factory preset value since continuing to log errors after the preset number is reached affects performance of the server. This alarm indicates a failing or failed memory module. Though this alarm is not critical, an error of this type indicates that a memory component is failing or has failed in the server issuing the alarm. The system continues to correct any errors it can.

**Trap ID**: 6017 (6003)

**Description:** 

The temperature status has been set to "Failed." The server will be gracefully shut down. You should monitor the room temperature and air conditioning. Verify that the covers to the servers are properly installed as this ensures proper air flow within the server box. Verify that all fans within the server unit are operational.

**Trap ID**: 6018 (6004)

#### **Description:**

"Continue" status (2) - The system is configured to continue operation when this alarm is received. NOTE: If the system continues to operate in this degraded condition, the hardware may initiate an immediate and unexpected shutdown.

"Shutdown" status (3) - The system has been configured to initiate a system shutdown when this alarm is received to protect hardware and data from damage or loss.

**Trap Name**: cpqHe3ThermalTempOk

**Trap ID**: 6019 (6005)

#### **Description:**

Previously abnormal temperatures have returned to a normal state. This is an improving condition.

A required system fan status has been set to "Failed." The included status variable indicates how the system will react to this failure.

"Shutdown" status (3) - The system has been configured to initiate a system shutdown when this alarm is received to protect hardware and data from damage or loss.

A Power-On Self Test error occurred during a reboot of the server. This error may have been noted during the Automatic Server Recovery reboot. The error might include non-correctable memory errors, fatal hard drive and/or controller failures, and system board failures. It may not be possible to view the server issuing the alarm, as the network operating system may have failed to load properly.

Description:

The redundant power supply subsystem has become degraded. Although the server will continue to operate, take corrective action soon to restore power redundancy.

This alarm indicates that the number of correctable memory errors for a particular memory module on the server has crossed a set threshold, indicating that the module needs to be replaced. Although the system continues to correct any errors it can, an error of this type indicates that a memory component is failing or has failed in the server issuing the alarm. Further degradation of the memory components may occur, and then errors may no longer be correctable.

#### Description:

The status of a storage system fan has changed. The current status is indicated by the included status variable.

"Failed" status (3) - The storage subsystem's internal fan(s) failed. The temperature may soon rise beyond factory preset levels. The storage system may shut down automatically to prevent damage to hardware and data loss.

"OK" status (2) - This alarm is issued when a change occurs in the operating condition of a monitored server's external storage system fan. A fan has been replaced, or has otherwise returned to normal operation. This alarm typically follows the Storage System Fan Status Change - Failed alarm.

**Trap Name**: cpqSs3TempFailed **Trap ID**: 8009 (8002)

#### Description:

The internal temperature has risen beyond factory preset levels and the storage system may shut down automatically to prevent damage to hardware and data loss. One or more fans may have failed, or a cover is off the storage system issuing the alarm.

**Description:** This alarm is the result of an extended power loss. The Compaq Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) is about to shut down. If the operating system is configured for automatic shutdown, this process has begun and should be inspected to make sure it will complete prior to the shutdown of the UPS.

# **Glossary**

Advanced Error Checking and Correcting (ECC) Memory

A fault tolerance feature that detects and corrects all single-bit memory parity errors, as well as detecting 2-bit and 3-bit memory errors. Ensure that common memory errors including the failure of an entire DRAM chip can be corrected without interrupting system operation.

Alarm

Notification that Compaq Insight Manager displays when certain events happen. For instance, if a monitored item changes, Insight Manager displays an alarm to notify you of the change. Insight Manager stores alarms in the Alarm Log. Alarm is synonymous with Trap. See also Trap.

Alarm Forwarding Destination

The pager that you configured to receive the alarms using the alarm forwarding feature. The alarm forwarding feature sends Compaq Insight Manager alarms to an alarm forwarding

destination pager.

Alarm Log

Log of all the alarms received at this workstation. If the Alarm Log is full and another alarm occurs, Compaq Insight Manager adds the alarm to the Alarm Log and deletes the oldest entry from the list.

American National Standards Institute

(ANSI)

An organization that acts as the national clearing house and coordinator for voluntary standards in the United States. ANSI is the organization representing the United States to the International Standards Organization (ISO). See also ISO.

ANSI See American National Standards Institute.

ASR-2 See Automatic Server Recovery-2.

**G-2** Glossary

AssetControl

Comprehensive set of hardware and software component information reported through integrated hardware, firmware, software, and third-party management tools. AssetControl provides detailed component information including manufacturer, model, and serial number for system, monitor, and hard drive(s). Also provides revision level information for system board, system ROM, Compaq option ROM, and device drivers developed by Compaq.

Asynchronous Management by way of modems and Management

remote management.

**Automatic Server** Recovery-2 (ASR-2) Feature designed to restart your server

automatically after a critical hardware or software error has occurred. If a critical error occurs, the server records the error in the Server Health Logs, reboots the system, and pages you. See also Server

Bridge Device that connects LANs with compatible

> addressing schemes, which usually means LANs of the same technology type; for example Ethernet-to-Ethernet, Token Ring-to-Token

Ring, Ethernet-to-Token Ring.

Btrieve A key-indexed record management system

designed for high-performance data handling and improved programming productivity. It allows your application to retrieve, insert, update, or delete records either by a key value or by sequential or random access methods.

Community String A password-like string with a 32-character

maximum which is to be used for read/write access

to the SNMP attributes.

Compaq Insight Management Agents Compaq specific software that can query a manageable device and provide information that responds to SNMP requests for data. *See* 

also SNMP.

Compaq Insight Management MIB Vendor MIB that describes the fault, performance, and configuration aspects of Compaq products.

See also MIB.

Corrected Memory

Log

A list of corrected memory errors which is stored

in non-volatile RAM.

Critical Error Log A log file that records catastrophic errors, such as

controllers (NICs) to a network. The hub is also
